BRITISH ENTRANTS PROMINENT IN SWIM

Many Important Empire Swimmers Promise to be Contenders in Wrigley Marathon at Toronto.

TORONTO, Aug. 25.—An unprecedented array of British athletes will strive to capture the world's long distance swimming championship in the third Wrigley Marathon at the Canadian National Exhibition here on Sept. 5.

Empire entrants have been slipping quietly into Toronto within the past few weeks and settling down to hard training. Most of those from the British Isles have joined the lists within the past few days. Now they form a formidable squad without taking into account the native Canadian contingent which numbers nearly 50 and before the list closes will include a score of dangerous contenders.

First of the Brits to arrive on the scene was Edgar Finlay of Sydney, New South Wales, holder of many titles. A second Australian, Tommy Adrian of Manley, is chiefly known as the coach who discovered and trained Andrew "Boy" Charlton, Australia's wonder-swimmer. Rumors that Charlton himself might enter the marathon were started when it was learned that Adrian was in Amsterdam with his protege for the Olympic games and will race in Canada on his way back to Australia with Charlton.

An entry from Millie Hudson, among the most brilliant of Britain's feminine stars and a veteran marathoner, came next and then the bulky Herr von Papenfuss of South Africa arrived in person. Von Papenfuss pounded along for more than 14 hours last year but lacked speed. Last winter however he trained in California and changed his stroke to a six-beat crawl which furnishes more speed with less effort.

Then Norman Leslie Dereham of Britain bobbed up suddenly in Toronto. Dereham holds the British Empire record for swimming the English channel, having crossed in 13 hours, 55 minutes to lower Gertrude Ederle's time.

George Close and David Billington are other entrants from Britain who promise to be real contenders. There are more than a dozen Empire entries from scattered sections of the globe, including two from the West Indies.

Grant, Winsloe, read selections Joshua 1:1-9, Matt. 25:40-46, Matt. 28:18-20 for the Scripture Lesson, and Mrs. F. E. Boothroyd, York, led in Prayer, followed by a duet: "Thou' your sins be a Scarlet," very sweetly sung by Miss Sadie MacLeod and Mr. Herbert MacLeod. In Mrs. Thomson's change to Miss Morson, she told her how the hearts of the members of the Island Presbyterian were overflowing with joy in having such a fine young life go as their representative to the foreign field, and dwell on the laws that must needs govern her life viz the laws of Sacrifice, Submission, Appreciation and Prayer. At the close of the earnest and touching address, Mrs. Thomson on behalf of the Executive presented Miss Morson with a framed, very handsome hand-painting, bearing in outstanding letters of gold on a black background, the promise of "My Grace is Sufficient for Thee," encircled with a wreath of pansies, expressive of thoughts. One verse of "He ledeth me" was sung by choir and congregation standing, and Rev. Mr. Constable, pastor of the church led

in the Prayer of Consecration. After a solo "Under Her Wings" was very feelingly rendered by Mr. Walter Burdette, Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, York, as the representative of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island conveyed greetings to Miss Morson and the Dundas congregation and in a masterly address presented to the people their obligations to the missionaries and the mission work of the church.

MacLeod, Hunter River, received from him by Mrs. Thomson, expressing his sincere regret in not being able to come to the Island in time for the meeting and congratulating the Presbyterian on the splendid recruit they have in the person of Miss Morson whom he knows personally, and expressing also his prayer for her guidance as she goes to minister to the needy in India.

During the offering, a splendidly rendered full chorus "Use me as it pleaseth Thee" was sung by the choir after which Miss Morson in few words very touchingly expressed her deep gratitude and appreciation and asked for the prayers of all that she might not unworthily do her part in the bringing in of the Kingdom.

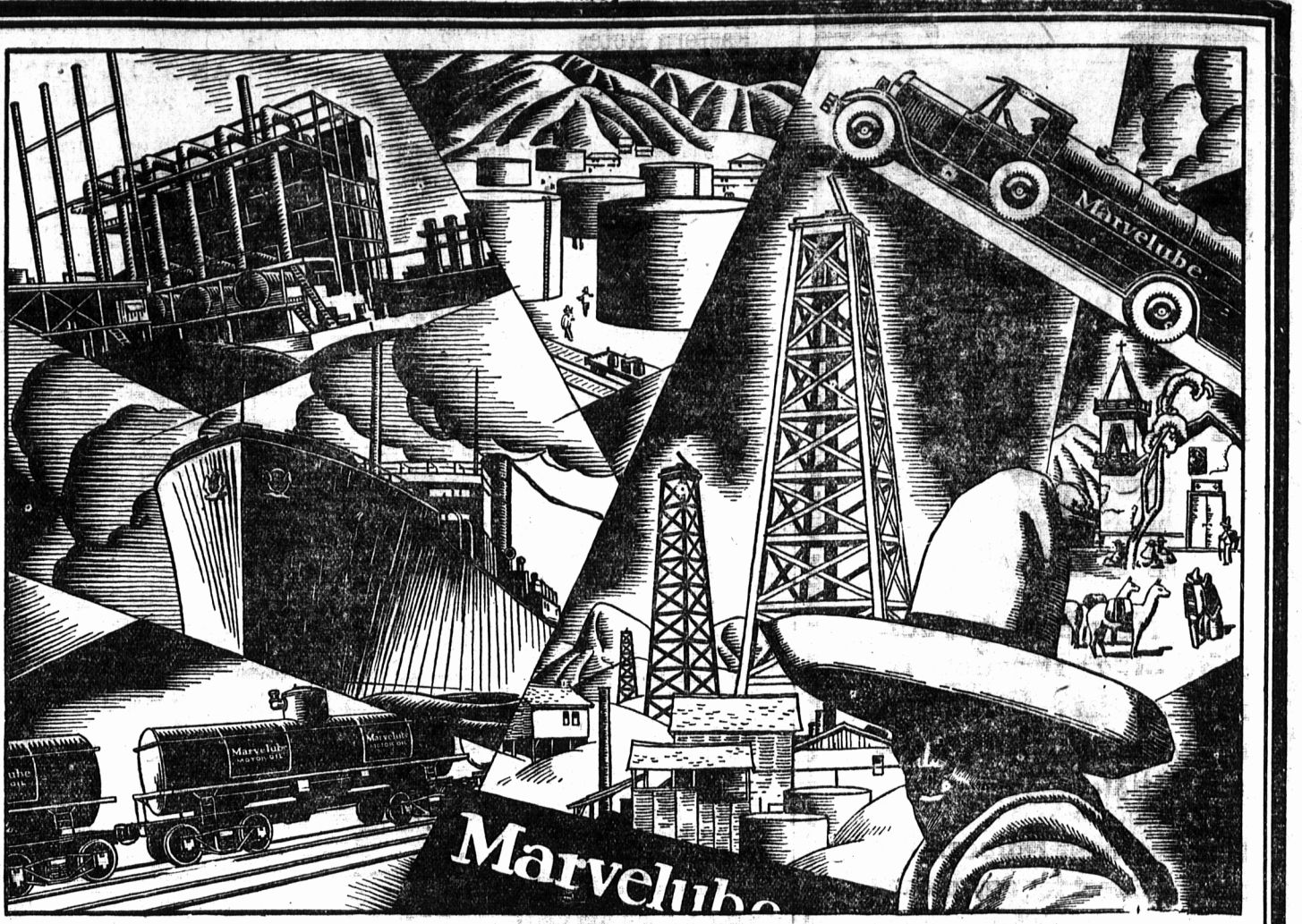
CAKE POINTERS.

A cake is done when the edges start to shrink away from the pan. Press the top of the cake very lightly. If it springs back when the pressure is removed, the cake is done.

Filling or icing should not be applied to a cake until it is thoroughly cold. Its weight might press the cake down before it is well set, and the warmth of the cake will prevent the frosting from hardening and it is likely to run off the sides of the cake.

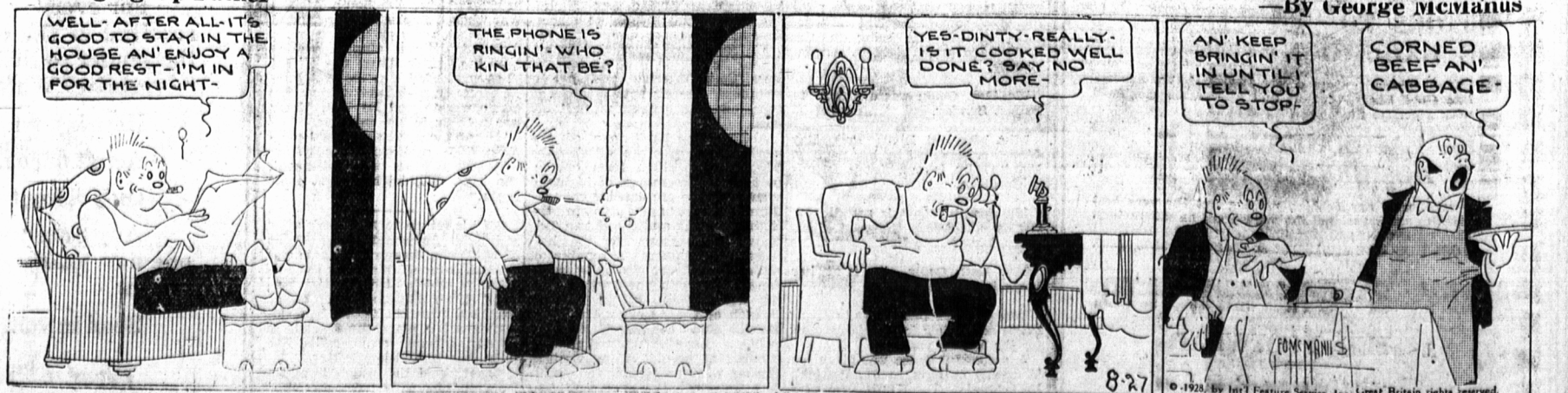
