### Tryon United Church Anniversary Services

The United Church at Tryon, situated on the bank of the Tryon River amidst pleasant surroundings, will be scene of Anniversary Services on Sunday, August 8th, and Monday, August 9th. The present beautiful edifice was erected and dedicated in 1882, sixty-six years ago. The services will also mark the one hundred and thirty-first anniversary of the Wesleyan Chapel in the year 1817. It is also the one hundred and fifty-sixth anniversary of the first Protestant service conducted in Tryon by the Rev. William Grandin of St. John, N. B., who spent seven weeks in the log house of Nathaniel Wright on the Austin Smith farm. Two years later "Societies" were organized by Rev. William Black.

Until 1817 this territory was included in the Charlottetown circuit, after which it became a separate circuit in charge of Rev. John Fishpool, under whom the first church was erected at Bequete. A happy contract with the past will be when, on Sunday next, the Anniversary service will be conducted by the Rev. H. C. Rice, D.D., resident inter-moderator of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown. And again on Monday evening when the special speaker will be the Rev. M. K. Charman, B.A., of Cornwall, whose maternal grandmother was a member of the well known Leard family of Tryon.

Mrs. Leigh Callbeck of Summerside will be the guest soloist on Sunday morning, and on Monday evening the worship of song will be led by the Inter-Community Choral Club, under the direction of Prof. William Jones.

### Fascinating Collection Of Rare And Historical Relics In O'Leary Store

Mr. A. J. Matheson, O'Leary, owner of the Retail Drug Store, has a fascinating hobby—the collecting of historical and unusual articles which are shown in a miniature museum in the rear of his store.

This collection began during World War I when Mr. Matheson received shrapnel of British make. In displaying it to his customers, much interest was aroused and friends and neighbors voluntarily brought in family heirlooms and relics of early days. Many of these exhibits tell of the hardships of the early settlers of the Province; of their labor with primitive tools and their marvelous ingenuity in overcoming the difficulties.

Among these are: candle molds, straw splitter used in preparation for plaiting straw hats; copper used warmer; reed and shuttles of a small loom; silver candle snuffers with tray brought from Scotland in 1806 by Mr. Matheson's grandmother; perforated hanging lantern with place for candle; southern or heckles for flax, a flail; a sickle; andirons; smoothing iron with compartment for metal heated in the fireplace.

Other pieces, three and one-quarter inches in diameter, founded in January, 1841, by the Rt. Rev. Bernard D. MacDonald, the piece being printed in the form of a cross on the coin; United States paper to the value of a "hundred and ten cents"; a one-cent script from Hong Kong; Prosperity Certificate; \$20. Confederate States of America note; \$1, \$3 and \$5 Bank of P. E. I. notes.

There are many freaks in wood, including a tree which had grown through a bottle; a heart shape cross-section of a tree with the hollow centre covered with bark; a cross-section of birch with V plainly marked; a piece of wood, found at Mill River which bears three distinct faces; another with a face and a baby; a spile imbedded in a maple tree; three petrified pieces of wood; a carved wooden book in attractive design.

Highly prized by Mr. Matheson is the affidavit of Mr. Jerry Peters, Howland, who in 1866 saw and first automobile in America in operation in this Province by the inventor, Rev. L. Abbe Georges A. Belcourt, a mechanical genius who had been parish priest in Rustico from 1859 to 1869. The Charlottetown Examiner of July 5, 1936, reports "an unique tea party was held at Rustico when the first automobile model was demonstrated to the amazement and delight of some 800 guests." This automobile appeared to be an ordinary driving carriage propelled with a small steam engine as a source of motive power. It was the forerunner of the present day automobile but the horses and the people were so afraid that this revolutionary form of transportation was abandoned by Father Belcourt.

On the wall is a poster dated 1870 "Public Meeting, FreeLand, Lot 11, on Tuesday at 6 o'clock P. M. to protest against the unjust and oppressive taxes imposed by the Local Legislature of this Province at its late session."

Hanging from the ceiling is an ox yoke about 100 years old which had been used by Cape Wolfe. Belcourt is a "token yoke" brought from Central India by missionaries and presented to Mrs. Matheson. This token or miniature yoke was made by the superstitious natives which they would construct the large yoke then thrown outside to the Unknown God that he might bring a blessing to the working yoke.

Another possession Mr. Matheson is particularly proud of is a group photo, containing the picture of King George V, when he was nineteen years of age and a sub-lieutenant on the H. M. S. Canada in the Royal Navy of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, taken in 1864 at the Club House, Charlottetown, after a game of cricket with a Charlottetown team.

A silver bar, etched by hand and comprising and ear scraper and tooth pick in sterling, part of the equipment of a Japanese lady of fashion, was presented by Dr. Florence Murray, missionary in Korea. An attractive ebony miniature board with attachments had been brought from Plymouth, England in 1806. Near by is a long, dainty necklace of horsehair which was made by a prisoner in Dorchester penitentiary and marked "square and compass."

A number of implements used by the Indians were in evidence—such as stones, sharpened for use and axes which had been dug up in the vicinity of O'Leary; tomahawks, arrow heads and spear heads. On the wall was a display of ancient firearms, bayonets, flint lock, powder flasks and shot pouches, a Scottish dirk or dagger and a powder horn from Scotland.

A few old books were shown, as a Hebrew Grammar printed in Dublin in 1759; a Gaelic Bible printed in Edinburgh in 1826; Chamber's Educational Course in Science borrowed from the St. Anne's Library in December, 1846; Sutherland's History of P. E. I. A glass case contains a fine collection of old coins from all parts of the world, including St. Dunstan's Total Abstinence pocket piece.



Among these are: spinning wheel; a small pin or yarn twister from Scotland; a compass running gear, two inches long and one inch in diameter with the grater on the side—this had come from Scotland.

Shown in the above picture are two of the four sets of Elliptical Spring Balances, weighing from 100 to 400 pounds respectively. They are known as Mancini's Balances and are perhaps the simplest application of the elastic extension of a spring for the purpose of weighing. The date of the invention is not known but a spring balance of the same principle in the Hansatic Museum, Bergen, Norway, is dated 1768. There is a similar set in the Science Museum, South Kensington, London. Distinctly marked on the 400 pound balance is the "square and compass."

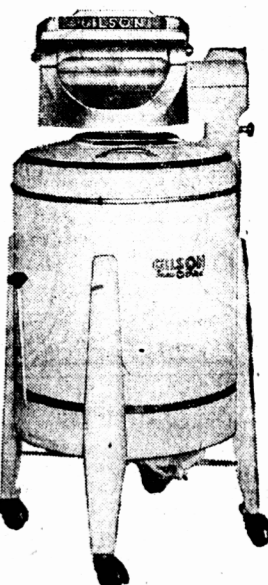
