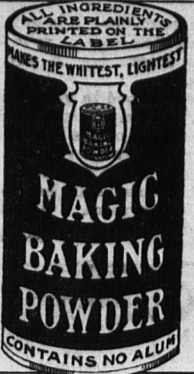

BULGARIA MUST FIGHT GREECE IF ATTACK IS MADE ON SERBIA.

WARSAW IS NOT A CITY OF TERROR AND CONFUSION

LONDON, July 31.—The story of Warsaw, threatened by siege, is told for the first time by a Polish gentleman, son of a large landowner in the outskirts of the city, who has just arrived here, and speaks as an eye-witness from the scene. His estate being today the artillery park of the Russian centre, from which their heavy field guns are manoeuvred for the defence of the city. His recital for the Associated Press is a record of his own personal observations, and he scrupulously refrains from any reference to general conditions not coming under his own eye.

"Warsaw! Is it a city of terror and confusion? people ask me. Not at all. Human nature shows its usual order. Warsaw is the background for a million Russian troops. This makes it the centre for a great number of Russian officers and strangers, who give it a cosmopolitan appearance of all human nature and even gaiety. The well-to-do people, the best of the city have passed through two points of safety in the west. The land-owning peasantry—for in Poland the peasants own their own land—have not means of flight and are stranded in the city, but keep out of sight. So that the city, with many officers, in gay uniform, its strangers and refugees, is transformed from its usual peaceful aspect and has taken on the appearance of a metropolis.

Thronged With People

"The streets are thronged. The theatres are open and crowded. The restaurants have throngs at their tables and on the street terraces. The cinema-graph shows the packed. There are bands and concerts. The feelings of terror does not seem to have struck the crowds. It is like life of London, which goes on with little thought of the Zeppelins. Only once has there been panic—when the Russian bank closed its doors and all other banks followed. Ready money could not be had, and everyone was in dread of the stoppage of funds and the interruption of the usual means of business and exchange. But that panic period has all passed, the banks are open and business is proceeding normally, but with a terrible economic change in prices, particularly in foodstuffs. Warsaw is absolutely dependant for its food supplies on the roads. But these are now in the hands of the military, who need them for the movement of troops, and the food for the troops. Poland itself supplies nothing, for the fields are burned and yield nothing.

Food for the People

"Prince Sewerny Czetwertynski has taken the lead in grappling the problems confronting the city—first to get enough food, and next public health and sanitation, combatting the cholera plague, which carried off hundreds outside the city, with twelve cases in Warsaw, and reburial of the masses of dead soldiers who have been hastily thrown together in shallow surface graves. He is a man of great executive ability, one of the grand consanguers of Poland, and is at the head of Warsaw's Central Committee, which deals with all emergencies.

"His first effort was for the food to meet the imperative needs of the city and surrounding country, chiefly flour, and prime necessities. The Russian authorities were favorable, but the military requirements came first, and besides, the urgent needs led to bribery among the petty railway officials, so that cars could not be got or moved without large payments. I myself saw 500 roubles of bribery exacted for moving a car of fish. So that Warsaw's stock of food has been getting scarcer and prices are mounting. Bread is double and triple the usual price. Eggs, which sold for two cents, are now six. At Easter each Russian soldier received four eggs—a million soldiers around Warsaw meant four million eggs—and the country was stripped of eggs. There is absolutely no beef, and a pound of poor meat now costs 60 copecks, against the usual price of 24

copecks—the poorest quality of steppe oxen. Meantime the army is very well hemmed-in population and peasantry, practically living on the leavings of the army.

Checked Cholera

"Prince Sewerny's emergency committee has given its attention to the threatening health condition. The dead soldiers were very badly buried at first, near wells where the water was polluted, and in heaps just under the surface near houses. But all the bodies have now been reburied deeply and away from wells and houses. This has stopped the cholera, which was the greatest dread, even in Warsaw, although nothing could be made known of it. In the estate next to ours the house was turned into a cholera hospital, and from this one place 200 dead from cholera were buried. It is on the main line of the passing army, so that many soldiers were stricken with the plague. But the committee has now saved the city and suburbs from that danger. In December the plague was at its worst and by February the rebuilding of bodies and other sanitary measures had effectively checked it, and now there is no cholera in Warsaw or outside.

"The German army has shown no quarter to the country but there has been no wanton destruction except at Kalisz. At my place they stopped ten days, taking all the cows and much clover, but not destroying. They paid by slip of paper, which means they never paid. They took our best horses for the artillery, and gave a wounded horse and a slip for 100 marks. But they kept repeating: "Everything is paid for!"

"The Germans carry no tents, and have no food supplies with them, so that as the cavalry, artillery and infantry swarmed over our place they lived in our houses and outhouses, and drew their food from the country, chiefly cows and livestock, slaughtering the best milk cows for food, and sparing only pedigree stock. Thus the country was denuded of all its supplies and ordinary stock. But they did not wantonly destroy except for a stated cause. A Russian conscript village next to us of concealing Cossacks in the cellars, and the village was burned down, not a thing remaining but the chimneys. A Polish village is not like an English one; it is a long row of peasant farmholders, built in a quadrangle, with clay walls and thatched roofs.

Some Strange Scenes

"Then came the Russians, forcing the Germans back and taking anything that was left. It led to some strange scenes. A Russian colonel came to our house for supper just as his troops had pressed back the Germans. While at supper a peasant came to make a complaint to the colonel that the Russians had taken six of his cows. The colonel was angry, and summoned his underlings, who had taken the cows, demanding an explanation.

"Yes," came the ready reply from the accused officer, "I took the cows. But they were German cows. Yesterday the Germans took them from this man and they were no longer his. We have taken only German cows."

"And the colonel agreed that he could not interfere with the taking of cows that had become German by the passing of the German army. So the poor peasants had their houses and barns burned and their stock taken
