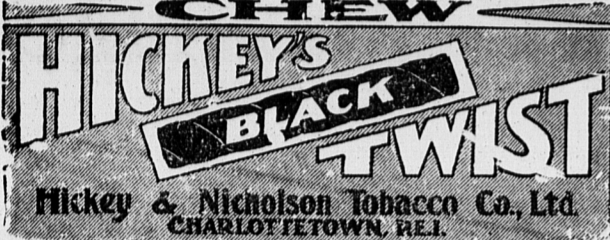

This was followed by a discussion on how to achieve the best in farming in view of the demand for increased production. Several farmers expressed their views, and some very useful suggestions were made. Mr. Robert McKinley ably presided over the deliberations. The audience was treated to a fine patriotic solo, beautifully rendered by Mrs. Leigh Warren. Mrs. Frank McLean ably presided at the organ. The following resolution was unanimously carried: "Resolved that we, the farmers of North River, being fully awake to the need of extra production, will seek by our exertions, to help the Empire and Allied nations in this critical period of the war." The Conference closed by singing the National Anthem.

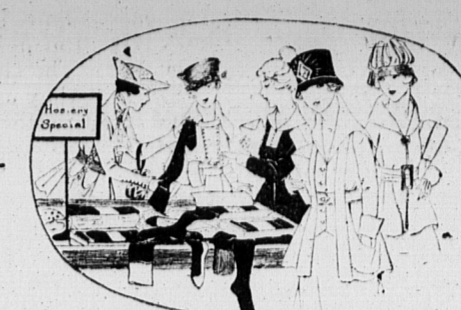

U. S. IMPORT RESTRICTION.—U. S. Consul Pierce has received from the Consul General at Halifax, the following additional information with reference to the embargo on imports into the United States: "We beg to advise you that the list of restricted imports number one, affects only ocean shipments from Canada. The general license permitting the importation into this country, of all commodities except those mentioned in the Presidential Proclamation of November 28th, 1917, is still in effect. Under this general license shipments of articles included in the list of restricted imports number one (except those the importation of which is expressly prohibited) may be over land or by lake steamer from Canada, and individual licenses will be required only for articles included in the Presidential Proclamation as aforesaid." The list referred to, number one, and which was referred to in The Guardian, includes agricultural implements, live animals, except for breeding purposes, all bread stuffs, except wheat and wheat flour, eggs, all fruits, except pineapples and bananas, fresh meats, all vegetables, except beans, lentils and peas. There are many other articles but the foregoing are the only ones which will be of interest to people in this province.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. BERNARD McKENNA

The death occurred at his home, Chestnut street, this city, on Monday evening, April 6th, of Mr. Bernard McKenna, in the 94th year of his age. He had been ill only a few days with an attack of pneumonia. He leaves to mourn four daughters and three sons. One of the last mentioned is Dr. McKenna of Oyster Bed Bridge.

PIERCE KELLY

In the passing away of April 22nd, of Pierce Kelly, an old landsman and hardy pioneer of Stanchel, Lot 67, has been gathered to his fathers, having reached the age of 84 years. The late Mr. Kelly spent the greater part of his life and labors in or near the late Daniel Kelly, and was a son of the old Daniel Kelly, of that district. A strong man in every sense he directed his energies towards the right education and establishing in life of his family, a large one, of sons and daughters. His was a wonderful physique, and despite his hard and unceasing farm labors, his intellect remained unclouded to the end, as he could read our ordinary newspapers without any artificial aid. His Catholic faith, inherited from good Irish ancestors, never wavered, although his neighbors all around were no Catholics, with whom he exchanged courtesies ever on friendly terms, and he found a way (as he had the will) always to make his way, he and family, to Kelly's Cross church, of which they were consistent and practical adherents. He is survived by his widow and four sons—John T., on the homestead; Pierce and James E., in Bar Harbor, Maine; and Richard in British Columbia; and four daughters—Mrs. Ed. Gallagher, Philadelphia; Mrs. Hugh Melsaac, Bar Harbor, Me.; Mrs. Wilfred T. Woods, Summerside; and Mrs. Charles E. Woods, Kelly's Cross. He was attended in his last illness by his pastor, Rev. Thos. Curran, who also conducted the funeral services on Wednesday morning, April 24th, at St. Joseph's church, Kelly's Cross. The pall bearers were, Alex. Cairns, Thomas Woods, Oswald Kelly, J. J. Trainor, Joseph Kelly and Patrick Hagan.
