In one of The Guardian's despatches yesterday which had reference to the loss of the lives of two men on the C. P. R. near Moosejaw a line accidentally left out prevented the completion of the sense of the heading. It should have told that two men in the passenger coach were killed.

Messrs Dryden and Riteh, who came to this Province on Saturday to investigate the sheep industry, left by the morning train yesterday for Georgetown. On Wednesday at 1.30 p.m. they will take evidence at the Court House in Summerside and on Thursday at the same hour in the Board of Trade rooms, Charlottetown.

The annual meeting of the Halifax Evangelical Alliance was held recently as follows:—President, Rev. L. J. Donaldson, Foxelected; 1st Vice-President, Rev. J. M. McInnes; 2nd Vice-President, Rev. A. The telephone cable connecting this Province with the mainland which was laid down several months ago and which had been giving splendid satisfaction lately has broken. U. S. Consul Frank Deedmeier, Charlottetown, writing to the Consular Trade Report says: Hides and skins to the declared value of \$34,600 were exported in the year 1909 from Prince Edward Island to the United States. Owing to the lower prices prevailing during the summer and fall of this year, these exports have fallen off about 50 percent. Prices paid at Charlottetown and Summerside in November 1909, were: Unassorted beef hides, 15 cents per pound; calfskins, \$1.20 per skin; sheep pelts, 30 to 70 cents per pelt. Present prices are: Unassorted beef hides, 10 cents; calfskins, \$1.10; and sheep pelts, 40 cents to \$1. Most of the beef cattle raised in this Province for the market is slaughtered in Newfoundland and Nova Scotia. Live-stock returns collected by the Dominion Government in 1909 gave these results: Horses, 2,132,489; milch cows, 2,849,306; other cattle, 4,384,773; sheep, 2,708,330. In the fiscal year ended March 31, 1909, Canada exported raw skins and hides to the value of \$4,029,676, and of this total value went to the United States \$3,844,843 worth. In the last fiscal year these exports to the United States amounted to \$5,847,775. Canada exported raw hides and skins in the fiscal year ended March 31, 1909, to the value of \$5,049,830 and from the United States to the value of \$1,443,971. In the last fiscal year these imports from the United States were \$1,700,420.

Marten was quoted at 1.3 rubles (\$0.65), as compared with 1.9 (\$0.95) the previous year, and white fox at 15 rubles (\$7.50), as against 25 and 30 rubles (\$12.50 to \$15), in 1909.

**NEGOTIATIONS AT WASHINGTON.**

OTTAWA, Jan. 23—Pending the arrival of Messrs Fielding and Patterson and their report to the Cabinet, as to their Trade Negotiations at Washington no authoritative comment on the terms of agreement reached is available.

In a general way, it is learned that the agreement includes only a very limited list of manufactured products involving no readjustment of the present trade exchanges, and working injury to no industrial interest.

The agreement is confined to freer exchange of natural products of the farm, mine, forest and fisheries.

It is believed the most important items will include dairy, fruit and vegetable products, hay, oils and fish.
