

# I.W.C. Share League Lead With Saints



## Strong Offensive In All Three Periods Give Local College Team 7-0 Victory

Johany Squarebriggs' Prince of Wales Welshmen, gaining momentum as the game went along last night, vaulted into a tie for leadership in the City Hockey League, when they defeated Saint Dunstan's University squad 7-0, in a game that was replete with fast skating and wide open play throughout.

Gaining momentum as the game progressed, the Welshmen skating like demons while on the offensive and sticking to their checks like leeches when forced on the defensive by Saints' counter attacks, took the play away from the Saints for most of the encounter and once they had piled up a 4-0 lead early in the second period, there was never much doubt about the outcome.

Saints, weakened by the loss of a couple of key players with several others on the ailing list, put up a courageous battle all through the piece, but just could not cope with the hard driving attacks thrown at them by the Squarebriggs' coached team.

But in all fairness to the Canadians and not trying to detract any from Summerside's deserved victory the locals were below usual strength Wednesday night. Coach Freddie Bradley was forced to do a lot of shuffling with his defence and forward lines due to players being sick and as a result something which Coach Bradley readily admitted, Canadians' performance was not up to the standard they showed in Summerside.

It is rumored also that several of the Canadians are not to perform with the Junior League that is being organized. Whether or not that is a fact is not known but if it is, it is an opinion that will practically leave the field wide open for the Summerside squad to represent the Maritime provinces and they will prove worthy representatives of the Province.

## Preakness Stakes Value Is Doubled

BALTIMORE, Jan. 24 (AP)—The value of the Preakness Stakes was raised today from \$50,000 to \$100,000, placing it on a par with such turf fixtures as the Kentucky Derby, Belmont Stakes and Santa Anita Handicap.

Three-year-olds are assured of running for a "hundred grand" prize in each of the stakes comprising the coveted "triple crown"—the Derby, the Preakness and the Belmont, in that order.

If the Maryland Racing Commission approves the Jockey Club's request for spring dates, the Preakness will be run at Pimlico on May 1, a week following the Kentucky classic as usual. The club has requested April 29-May 11 for its spring meeting.

## Bobby Riggs Retains Pro Tennis Title

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 24 (AP)—Pint-sized Bobby Riggs professionally defended his world professional tennis championship today, outlasting red-haired Don Budge, 6-6, 8-4, 6-4, 9-7.

Budge's fans were glad to see him to his seats until he past midnight watching the pair battle for the title. Riggs won in a December tournament, clouded by an arm injury which left Budge "impotent in the alighting set."

Budge's famed cover-up smock was working to perfection as he walked off with the first set, and Riggs broke his service and pounded his way through five of the next six games.

Budge's steadiness which won the third set, as he repeatedly forced the lanky Californian into errors. The victory came when he broke Budge's service on the eighth and tenth games.

The final set was one of the most dramatic ever contested here. Riggs had a 4-2 lead when Budge turned on the pressure to pull into a 6-4 tie. Then Riggs took two to lead 6-6, but Budge matched Bobby's efforts to go ahead, 7-6.

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## Former N.Y. Mayor Receives Boxing Plaque For 1945

NEW YORK, Jan. 24 (AP)—Praising the fight game as a sport but warning against exploitation of fighters, former Mayor Jimmy Walker last night received the Ed-Edwards Memorial Boxing Plaque for 1945.

Walker, who was named as the man who did the most for boxing in 1945.

Presenting the plaque before the annual dinner of the Associated Press sports writer and war correspondent killed in Spain in 1948 was made at the annual dinner of the New York Boxing Writers Association. The writers also presented an award for long and meritorious service to Jimmy Johnston for his 50 years as a fighter manager and promoter.

Making the Walker presentation, former Postmaster General James A. Farley, one time chairman of the State Athletic Commission, recalled that he headed the Boxing Board shortly after the New York boxing law, which was written by Walker, was passed by the State Legislature in 1920.

"This plaque," Farley said, "is an award for long and meritorious service to the boxing law and Sunday baseball," the Mayor said.

Nat. Fleischer, editor of Ring magazine, the magazine's "boxer of the year award" to Willie Pep, recognized in New York three straight games, Budge played off match point three times in the sixteenth game before going down.

Budge's manager, A.G. Fitzsimmons, said that Budge had trimmed the old master, Bill Tilden.

## Bill Cox Back In Sports Business

NEW YORK, Jan. 24 (AP)—Bill Cox is back in the sports business after his experience with the president of the O.A.A. in Philadelphia, Philles, noisily pleading through an all-American news conference contender for the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Cox still has baseball on his mind and has formed some definite anti-baseball opinions, but he's a grid promoter now.

Equal partners with Gerald H. Stines and Ed. Stines in the magazine-publishing firm, Cox officially is the general manager and vice-president of the Dodgers. His assistants include coach Hal Egan, a business manager Freddy Fitzsimmons and assistant coach Hank Reese.

Cox, who bought the baseball Philles in February, 1945, was declared "permanently ineligible" to be president of the O.A.A. because of the club in a ruling issued by Landis Nov. 23 of that year. Landis said the ruling was based on baseball games against the major league ruling. The owner dropped the matter after a public hearing before Landis.

Professional clubs up to now have turned over to the O.A.A. \$500 for any player taken into the N.H.L. and \$250 for players signed by minor professional clubs. Panter's plan is to split hockey in two brackets. The lowest would be from "Junior C" to intermediate "A", a developing ground governed under the tightest control.

Next would be the junior and senior "B" clubs which would be forced to pay a lump sum of money before drafting players from the lower ranks.
