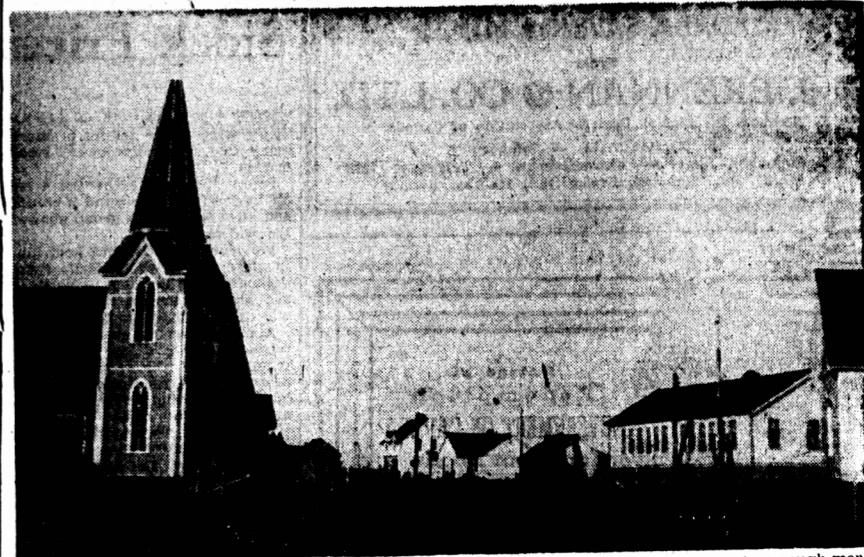

A Visit To Lennox Island

Winding up my work and visits
in various parts of Prince County
I went across to Lennox Island. It
being my first visit to the Island
I was impressed by the hospitality
of the people, everyone seemed
very friendly and enjoyed talking
to visitors.

As the regular ferry was off for
repairs a motor boat was engaged
to carry passengers to and from
the Island. The day was warm and
bright which made the crossing a
pleasant one.

On arriving at the Island we
stopped to chat with some work-
men who were busy digging post

holes in preparation for electricity
which the people there are soon to
enjoy, following this we called on
Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Tuplin. Mr.
Tuplin was away at the time and
in the house we found Mrs. Tuplin
and also Mrs. John Francis who
was busy mixing a cake. They had
just finished digging their potatoes
the day previous and now the task
of cleaning the dust out of the
house was to be tackled. Mrs. Tup-
lin took time out however, to show
her visitors about their cosy home-
stead and their new barn which
they had recently built.

Every family on the Island have
their own farm or lot of land which
is owned by the Government; most
of the homes were built by the
Government although some, like
the new one we visited, were built
by themselves. There are about 30
families living on the Island and
they make their living by fishing
and farming in the summer and by

basket making during the winter.
The Government has an acre or so
of potatoes planted there every
year for those who cannot afford
or for those who are unable to
work.

Recently a lovely school was
built which has two rooms on the
main floor and one in the base-
ment where science and other
classes will be conducted. Rev. Fr.
Francis teaches the senior classes,

people and they raise enough money
to support their own priest. The
church is the only thing on the
Island that the Government does
not help to support.

The people on the Island love
goats' milk, but according to the
womenfolk they certainly have no
love for the little goat as this mis-
getting into trouble. We were
shown what was once a beautiful
flower garden and is now nothing
but rubble, the family goat we
were told had chewed the rope by
which he was tethered and getting
into the garden ate all the pretty
flowers.

It was now time to leave and
with the kind invitation to come

For recreation they have a fine

In winter skating is the main at-
traction for both young and old on
the ice. Skiing is also a favorite
sport. Every summer St. Anne's
Sunday is the big day for the In-
dians here when they celebrate this
day, hundreds of people from near
and far come to the Island every
year to celebrate with the Island-
ers. In the morning everyone goes
to church while in the afternoon a
regular picnic is held including a
ball game with some visiting team.
