### ABEGWEITS WORKING OUT

The Abbie ball team, Prince Edward Island baseball champions are working out daily on their diamond under the watchful eye and experienced supervision of Manager Lou Campbell, who reports his squad in the pink of condition and ready for the word that sends them away in their quest for Maritime baseball supremacy.

The play-offs, it is expected, will start next week when the locals meet the New Brunswick champions, and it is a safe bet no matter what team they meet it's going to be baseball in all its flourishes from the first inning to the ninth.

Speaking of attendance, it looks as if all records will be broken by the crowds expected.

### RYAN LEFT YESTERDAY

Dinney Ryan, Prince Edward Island's sensational half-miler and representative at the recent Olympic trials at Hamilton, left yesterday afternoon by the Hochelaga for Pitou where he competes with the greatest runners in Eastern Canada at the big athletic meeting being held there today. Ryan is not only the lone Abegweit representative on the Island's best bet to win the half mile and perhaps shatter the Maritime record of 1 minute and 59 seconds which has stood the test of time for the last 25 years. It is held by Ross of Amherst. Ryan clocked the 880 yards at Hamilton in two minutes flat, just a second slower than the Maritime record.

Since returning from Hamilton he has been training diligently for this big day. In conversation with him yesterday he appeared confident and personified as to his chances of a win and a Maritime record. We wish the boy every luck.

### AS GOOD AS MATTY

"Just as good as Matty." Just a few words uttered by John McGraw, but they mean a lot. The utterance was in reference to Larry Benton, who is helping to shove giants to a pennant. Benton has established a record for consistency hard to equal and his admirable control has reminded many veterans of "Big Six" in his prime. McGraw, the magnanimous and mighty sident, molder, has bolstered up his twilight corps by recalling Jack Scott to aid in mound duty and is giving him a title chance just as he did four years ago. Scott is to be a Giants' year again, and will be headed, veteran observers would like to see Giants and Athletics mingle again but at the current writing the big braces in the fall seems destined to be an all New York team. Yankees have indulged themselves in a slump as much as they dare. Their hitting class is bound to tell over the stretch run.

### FONTAINE VS. MCKENNA

Jim Pendergast, the Tex Rickard of Prince Edward Island, the man who brought George Allen here to fight McKenna last week is far from satisfied at the attendance at this bout, and let slip the remark that he will not let slip the remark that he packs 4,000 fans in the Arena, even if he has to get "Det. Fontaine of Montreal here to fight McKenna for the middleweight championship of Canada. This bout would be a plum in the hat of the Kensington mogul, who is never satisfied at half-way measures with regard to the promoting business. His recent New Annan Races easily testify to that. As both fighters claim the Canadian middleweight title and are jointly recognized by various American and Canadian sport publications, the Boxing Commission of Canada would have no alternative but to assent to the go.

Montreal is after the bout and so is Vancouver Sun, proprietors on the coast are angling for the bout.

If Pendergast gets this "shot" for a little match it would not only be a compliment to "Big Jim" but would be a source of much outside

If this bout comes to a head and Mr. Pendergast is successful in getting it for Prince Edward Island, it will undoubtedly be held on Thanksgiving night, Monday, November, 12th. A McKenna-Fontaine championship bout would be the leading ring event in the history of boxing in Canada.

### MCKENNA-NEMIS-BROWN

Jack McKenna the fighter, the walloping Canadian middleweight who knows no fear and has yet to be back up from any ring opponent, meets Joey Brown of Detroit in Sydney on Labor Day, Sept. 3rd and nine days later climbs through the ropes to give battle to his rival Johnny Nemis who is yet basking in the limelight of heresy ever since he won from Jack some years ago when he was a welterweight. McKenna was green then and knew nothing of the boxing game, but was willing to fight. On this occasion both are middleweights with Nemis 160 pounds and Jack 154. It will be a slashing battle. Nemis is a clever boxer and the hit and run-away style which gives the fans more rounds when McKenna is fighting, because he does not know anything about running. However, the amateur ruling of "clean breaks" which featured McKenna's fight with Allen here will not be tolerated by the fans of Cape Breton, and neither will Jack consent. He has told me himself, "that never again will he consent to clean breaks, as anybody can jab and get away if he makes up his mind not to fight." He added, the fans pay to see action, and action they must get, notwithstanding the consequences. A fighter that cannot "take it" should never enter a ring.

The writer predicts that although Nemis is a clever boxer he will not be on his "pins" after the fifth round. McKenna is too vicious an fighter for Johnny Nemis.

### SPEEDY VICTOR OUTGLASSES OPPOSITION

SAINT JOHN, N. B. Aug. 28.—In these days of shared records in sport, there is one in baseball which has just come to light in Pittsburgh. Writers in that city are claiming new honors for Capt. Harold J. Traynor, glittering three-year-old of the trotting world yesterday by winning the classic Hambletonian Stake at the New York State Fair. Spencer, with Billy Leese in the sulky, made a show of his field and won in straight heats thereby enriching his owner, David M. Look, of New York, to the extent of \$45,000.

In the first heat Spencer clipped a full second off the track record for three-year-olds, trotting the mile in 2:02 1/2, as compared to the record in 2:03 1/2 Commodore Wilson hung up here four years ago. The second heat was clocked in 2:04.

Both miles were faster than any other previously recorded in the big stake.

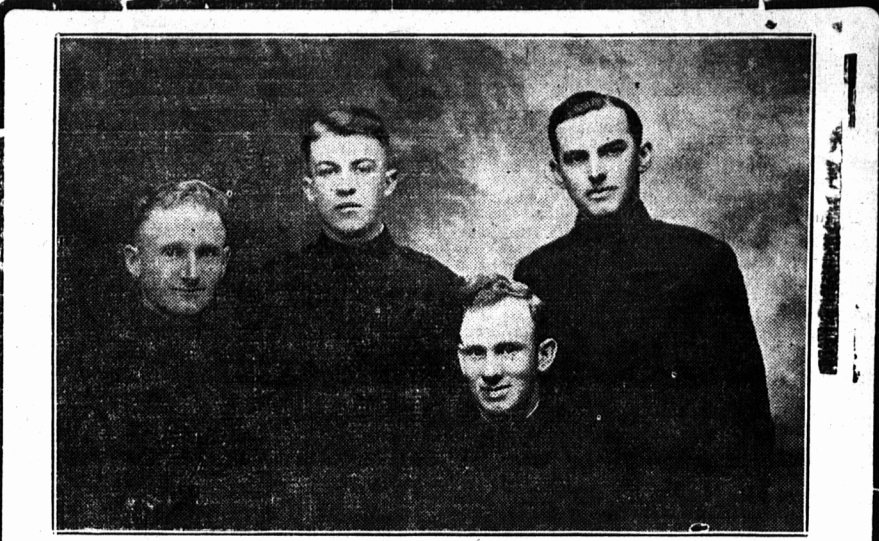

### NEW ZEALAND MARKET FOR CANADIAN MACARONI

The total annual consumption of macaroni in New Zealand amounts to about 600,000 pounds of a value of £12,000, writes Assistant Trade Commissioner Paul Sykes, Auckland, in the forthcoming issue of the Commercial Intelligence Journal. The demand has been met almost exclusively by Australian manufacturers, although small quantities of the Canadian and United States product have also been imported. No locally manufactured supplies are available. A recent charge in the tariff offers to small inducement to Canadian firms interested in export possibilities.
