Two Doukhobors arrived at Halifax by steamer the other day en route to Manitoba. They should have taken the C. P. R. train from Halifax yesterday morning. One of them did, and he had his companion's ticket as well as his own. The other, who had gone out to purchase some bread, missed the C. P. R., but came over on the train which reached St. John's last night. On his arrival he was handed over to I. C. R. Policeman Collins, who was advised to endeavor to arrange to get his ticket from the man who passed through in the afternoon. A telegram was sent to the conductor of the C. P. R., and it is expected the ticket will be returned today. Policeman Collins experienced considerable difficulty in getting what information he did from the unfortunate fellow. A woman was sent for who could understand what the Doukhobor said and make him understand her, but her English was so much off that she could not make Collins understand her. Finally a young fellow was obtained who got over this trouble. The Doukhobor was looked after last night at the police station, and will be sent on his journey westward today. St. John Sun 21st.
