Bigger and Better Hotels For N. S.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 18. — The provision of adequate hotel accommodation in Nova Scotia has been dealt with in the past year more vigorously than during any similar period in the history of the province. In Sydney the new 75-room fireproof hotel, "The Isle Royale" built by community effort, was recently opened, providing a much needed utility, that city having suffered from lack of suitable hotel accommodation since fire destroyed the main hostelry years ago.

Halifax will have a fine new fireproof structure ready for occupancy in the early fall, the Lord Nelson, also financed largely by community effort. This enterprise, involving expenditure of over a million dollars, will add a hundred rooms to the hotel space in Halifax.

Additions being made to the Grand Hotel in Yarmouth will almost double the accommodation provided in that hostelry and the whole structure will be brought up-to-date.

A contract was let recently by the Dominion Atlantic Railway for a new 100-room structure overlooking Digby Harbor close to the company's present summer hotel, The Pines. It is intended to have this hotel open for business April 1, 1929.

Work has been delayed on construction of the proposed combination hotel and terminal station at Pownal, which the Dominion Atlantic Railway at the Oceanic National in Halifax which, when completed, will provide modern hotel facilities connected directly with the landing stages of the passenger line docks and the railway terminal.

To Use Pulverised Coal

HALIFAX, N. S., May 18. — The Dominion Coal Company's collier Langan, 800 tons, now being equipped at the Halifax shipyards with equipment which will permit the use of pulverized coal will be the first steamer in the British Empire to try the experiment. The new equipment will do away with the sweating stokers who previously shoveled coal into the nine furnaces of the Langan, and substitute machinery that will pulverize the fuel and project it into the furnaces. The advantage hoped for is cheaper operations, lowered fuel costs as the lower grades of coal may be used and lower consumption of fuel.

The experiment has been tried successfully on a United States steamer and use of pulverized coal in stationary plants where space is not a problem, has been well established. The fuel enters the fire chamber in the form of a jet and the fine powder burns while in a state of suspension.

Successful use of such equipment as is being installed in the Langan will result in a market for large quantities of Nova Scotia coal otherwise not suitable for the ordinary coal burning steamer, experts declare.

SAVE THE "POKER HANDS"

Wright Flexible Axle Motors, Ltd. Acquires Plant for Motor Industry

Negotiations recently concluded between Wright Flexible Axle Motors, Limited, in possession of the buildings and land formerly occupied by the Canada Carriage & Body Company, a property located in the growing suburb of Montreal East, bounded by Marien Avenue, Ontario and Demontigny Streets, and which was acquired by agreement of purchase from the town council. It is proposed to use the property for the production of this new motor car, and its operation is expected to materially assist the industrial development of the municipality.

The land on which the plant is situated, covers an entire city block measuring 315 feet by 736 feet and embraces an area of 231,840 sq. ft. The property is valued at \$253,000 by the town council.

The main building, which it is planned to use for assembling the Wright Flexible Axle automobile, is a two-story and basement solid brick structure, 142 feet wide by 312 feet long, with a total floor area of 85,068 sq. ft. It permits of two continuous chassis assembly lines being operated, which would enable a full construction program to be carried out without breaking the lines. The basement has a ceiling height of 9 feet and the other storeys 14 feet.

The building to be used as a body and paint shop is also of solid brick construction, two storeys high, measuring 68 feet wide by 142 feet long, and has a floor area of 18,070 sq. ft. with ceiling heights of 14 feet. The basement of this building is suitable for new car storage and incoming stock. Other buildings taken to place the buildings in condition for the reception of manufacturing equipment.

Dumb Man Made To Speak

LONDON, May 19. By the use of a simple, yet ingenious device, a voice specialist has been able to restore the speech to a dumb man.

The patient was an elderly French polisher, who was operated upon at the Middlesex Hospital for cancer of the throat. It was necessary to remove his larynx and he thus automatically deprived of the power of speech.

After the operation the man came under the treatment of the hospital Consultant for defective speech who experimented with various methods of producing artificial speech before he discovered how to utilize the breath exhaled by the man

to produce natural sounds. "For about five months I worked at the problem," says the Consultant.

"I first thought of trying a method which a Viennese specialist has discovered, but gave that up. Then I experimented with reeds and diaphragms with the idea of forming an artificial larynx, but these were much too mechanical, and restricted the breathing.

"It occurred to me that if I could form a passage for the breath to reach the mouth, more than half the problem would be solved.

"I therefore made a tube, flexible except for the ends to form an external connection. One end is placed in the aperture of the throat. The other end, which has a special fish-tailip, held in a certain position in relation to the lips.
