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Shot Fired At Crow Hits Young Man In Back

Ivan Betts, 21, of Glenwood near O'Leary is a patient in the Prince County Hospital with a 22 calibre bullet in his back, following an accidental shooting that occurred on the road near his home late Monday afternoon. The shot was fired by seventeen-year-old Wilfred Harris, who was shooting at a crow from the porch of his home and it is thought that the bullet ricocheted off some water in a flooded field between his house and the road. At the time of the shooting Betts and his brother were walking behind a loaded horse-drawn sleigh on their way home.

It is claimed that a spruce hedge prevented Harris from seeing the men and the sleigh going along the road about 125 feet away. The injured man was immediately taken to the Prince County Hospital at Summerside where it was found that the bullet entered his back and lodged under his lung. At present he is being kept under observation and it is hoped that an operation to remove the slug may not be necessary. His condition last night was reported as good.

The matter is under investigation by Alberton detachment, R. C. M. P.—S.

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S' Side Station To Observe 25th Birthday Of R.C.A.F.

The 25th anniversary of the Royal Canadian Air Force, which is being celebrated across Canada on Friday, April 1st, will be observed at the R.C.A.F. station, Summerside, by a parade in the morning which will be attended by the Lieutenant-Governor, J. A. Bernard, who will hold an investiture when medals will be presented to four members of the service.

At ten minutes before ten in the morning the observance will commence with the flag raising ceremony at the parade square. The Lieutenant-Governor and party will arrive on the square promptly at ten o'clock and he will inspect a guard of honor.
