CATTLE PURCHASES.—A number of valuable purchases were made at the Amherst Fair by the Islanders. Among the purchases, by Dr. J. S. Jenkins was an outstanding Shorthorn heifer, winner of four championships and winner of that honor at the Winter Fair, a second heifer, Lady Fashion, the vealving heifer class. The fair purchase by Dr. Jenkins was a bull "Royal Eclipse," which is the most successful bull ever winner to the Maritime Provinces. He was bred by P. B. McIntyre, Ross-saire, Scotland, and imported to Canada by Miller and Dryden of Ontario. J. M. Laird & Sons of Kelvin, purchased a valuable two-year-old heifer, a winner in her class, Kevin Brown, Victoria, purchased a yearling heifer, the progeny of the first prize milking Shorthorn in the milk test. These breeders of Shorthorns are to be highly commended for their enterprise in bringing such valuable animals to P. E. Island and it is to be hoped they will be encouraged and substantially supported by their fellow breeders and all others who are interested in the progress of Shorthorns. Roy Silliphant of Summerside, purchased a champion steer, Summerside Agriculturist.

Beer-Hound's Paradise Clubs And Bars Galore

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 19.—Continual raids on all clubs and hotel bars, and seizure of beer stocks have been recommended by members of the provincial liquor control board to the Vancouver police commission as a solution of the problem of the sale of beer. Archie Johnson, chairman of the liquor board, explained that it was a mistake to think the Government could not cancel the license of any club selling beer, and keep it cancelled. Nine new clubs opened last night, and sale of beer in hotel bars and clubs goes merrily on.

FREIGHT SURCHARGE WILL BE 5 PER CENT.

OTTAWA, Dec. 17.—In accordance with the judgment and order of the Board of Railway Commissioners issued January 14, 1921, the rate of exchange in connection with shipments of freight between points in Canada and the United States from December 15 to December 31, inclusive, will be eight and one-half per cent and the surcharge on the said traffic will be five per cent. The rate of surcharge on international passenger business will be based on nine per cent. exchange.

QUEEN MARIE MAY VISIT AMERICA

Rumania Queen's Mission is to Create Interest in the Red Cross Work.

LONDON, Dec. 19.—Some time in December, America may be visited by one of the most beautiful women in Europe—Queen Marie Alexander Victoria of Rumania. In the story books for children and in Europe queens are always beautiful, whereas in fact many of them are plain personages with some very dowdy clothes. Queen Marie isn't in the category. She is really good to look upon. In fact, it is a sort of tragical piece of luck for Rumania that most of the princesses are very pretty. Fair-haired, with blue-grey eyes and a democratic manner, she is beloved all over her adopted country for her charity. When Rumania, a number of years ago, had a cholera plague, she was foremost in the labor of providing hospitals. When her country went into the great war and was almost wiped out by the German hosts, she worked night and day as a Red Cross nurse, as such she came in contact with thousands of the soldier sons of the nation. Whenever she comes to London she usually slips out of the kindly palace of her cousins and goes shopping in Bond street, just like any other married woman with a number of children. Her mission in America will be mainly to secure interest in Red Cross and other charitable work in Rumania. The country has by no means recovered from the tragedy of the war and the powers that be want outside help. Princess Reant, one of her younger children, also bids fair to be the beauty of the family. The Rumanian embassy here says there is only one point that makes them doubtful about the date of the Queen's visit to America being December; for various state reasons the King and Queen have not been crowned and the ceremony may not take place until next fall. PLAN FOR FRENCH NAVY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—Proposals made by the French delegation on Thursday at the Naval Committee Armament Conference, included a definite schedule of construction which contemplated by 1941 of the present French battle fleet by ten new ships totalling 250,000 tons. The proposals and accompanying schedule of the planned construction was presented with the full authority of the French Government. It was learned on good authority tonight, and were not as had been indicated some in quarters, merely a tentative departmental plan. MADRID, Dec. 19.—The Spanish gunboat Bonifaz, has captured two French sailing vessels which were conveying consignments of arms and munitions to the Moorish insurgents and sunk another vessel engaged in the same occupation. It was announced in an official report received here today.
