OUTSIDE of the Wanderers says the Annapolis News, who, in fact, seem to be the M. P. A. A., nearly every club was in favor of permission being granted the New Glasgow hockey players to take the trip to Montreal. Truro is in favor of it and as would be seen by the resolution passed by the Ramblers, this club also strongly expressed its disapproval of the action of the body that it is supposed to govern sport in the province.

The question now is, what will happen, and the fans here are eagerly awaiting a reply from the M. P. A. A. to the Ramblers' resolution. Will they disqualify New Glasgow and if so, what will happen if the Rambler go to New Glasgow to play the opening game of the league? The fact that "nearly every club was in favor of permission being granted the champions to take the trip" will be news to those who attended the meeting. In the first place the champions needed no such permission, the only question being how the Association would regard them when they played against professionals. In this City men have been outlawed for years for doing the very same thing. This will be interesting news to all hockey players in Prince Edward Island especially since the M. P. A. A. have disqualified the New Glasgow men.

It is understood that the City accounts will show a surplus of \$284.30 for the year just ended. Of the year's expenditure \$1000 was appropriated toward the Market House sinking fund.

FRIENDS here of Jimmy Williams, the Charlottetown boy who is the star player on the New Glasgow hockey team will be interested in this from the Montreal Star—"It is announced that little Williams of the New Glasgow team, has made such a good impression that he may be hired by the Wanderers, and, if not, by another club, which is looking at him with favorable and envious eyes."

The full text of the basis of the proposed affiliation of Prince of Wales College with McGill is not yet available for publication, but it is understood that McGill proposes, by a slight extension in the first year work of the Prince of Wales College to accept it for matriculation, and that the work be further extended along the same line in Prince of Wales College, so as to cover the McGill first and second year work in Arts, and possibly by a further extension, the first year in Science, and the faculty of agriculture, to be formed next year in connection with the St. Anne de Bellevue College, near Montreal. It is understood that the curriculum of the Prince of Wales College is to be determined by McGill, and the elimination of certain subjects of the present Prince of Wales curriculum would give the opportunity to make the necessary increase in classics and mathematics that McGill would call for.

The admiralty's side of the Exchequer Court of Canada, met at 11 o'clock yesterday, Chief Justice Sullivan presiding, to try the case of the Magdalen Island Steamship Co., Ltd., vs. the ship Diana, an action of damage for collision and salvage. The collision took place between Scouris and East Point in September between the plaintiff's steamship Amelia and the Diana. The amount of damages claimed in the suit by the plaintiffs is \$6,000 for collision and \$5,000 for salvage. A counter claim was made by the owners, Parkhurst & Parkhurst, Gloucester, Mass., for \$5,000 damages sustained by the ship Diana. The lawyers engaged on the case are for the plaintiff, W. S. Stewart, K. C., and Robert E. Harris, K. C., of Halifax, for defendants, Attorney General Peters, Edward S. Dodge, a member of the Bar of Massachusetts and Fred. R. Taylor of St. John. It is expected that the case will occupy the remainder of the week. F. W. Hyndman has been appointed nautical assessor to the Court.
