It is remarked by an astronomer that the closing month of the century is marked by no celestial pageant. All the outer planets of our system are hidden behind the sun, and those that revolve within the earth's orbit are all morning stars, and hence invisible in the evening. "So on the last evening of the century we shall see those silent and eternal stars alone which present the same aspect to us that they did to the sages of the East more than thirty centuries ago—Orion and Pleiades, familiar to star-gazers when the book of Job was yet unwritten, even as in present times, and seeming even more inconceivably far beyond our reach to us than to them."—Is there not some similarity between the absence of all the more prominent planets from the evening sky, and the comparative barrenness of the intellectual firmament—the absence of very great men, at the century's close.

We have received the twelfth and concluding number of the Educational Review Supplementary Readings in Canadian History. The number contains highly interesting and valuable papers on Slavery in Canada, the Combat at the Mill on Lacolle, Responsible Government, Notes on Madawaska, and Suggestions for the Investigation of Local History. We are glad to find that the series of 12 numbers can now be had in book form, sent post-paid to any address for \$1.15, from George U. Hay, publisher, St. John. The volume contains a unique, interesting and valuable collection of sketches of Canadian History not otherwise obtainable. Doubtless it will have a large sale.

We have received from Mr. Frank A. Hill, Secretary of the State Board of Education of Massachusetts the sixty-third annual report of the Board. It will be remembered that Mr. Hill visited the Island and addressed the Teachers' Institute. There is probably no country in the world where education is more general or where educational methods are more thorough and effective than in the Bay State, and the report is the more valuable on that account.

DOWN ON ZEPHRA

Rev. Mr. Sellar a Native of P. E. Island.

MAKES A EUROPE

That has Made a Stir and Aroused Indignation in Social Circles.

The St. John Telegraph contains the following reference to Rev. Geo. A. Sellar, son of Mr. George Sellar of this city:

"In the Exmouth street Methodist church Sunday morning the Rev. George A. Sellar arraigned the theatre and condemned it as an institution unworthy the patronage of any right-minded Christian man or woman, set it forth as the promoter and delineator of passions calculated to destroy the moral character of any one not already seared by personal contact with evil, and he declared in effect that its patrons were principally degenerates, men who were frequenters of the saloon, gamblers, etc., and abandoned women. He quoted to use his own words, 'The popular Zephra,' as 'no exception.' He went back to early Roman history for an example of law levelled at the theatre; quoted various one-time stage and managerial authorities, reverted to the opinion of a committee of the British parliament, and also of the United States congress—100 years ago—etc., in order to support his position."

It would be needless to say Rev. Mr. Sellar's denunciation of the R. K. Y. C. amateur theatricals has caused a furore throughout the length and breadth of the city. It was one of the chief topics of conversation in the homes and about the streets to-day. Especially are the members of the Royal Kennebecasis Yacht Club and their "Zephra" friends in a state of excitement. The chaperones, who included some of St. John's society leaders, mothers of some of the best families in this city, are deeply aggrieved at Mr. Sellar's assertions and consider they, as well as the young ladies under their care, have been unmistakably insulted.

"If Mr. Sellar only knew it," said one of the best known society women in town, who was one of the "Zephra" chaperones, "there are very many Methodist young ladies and gentlemen in the production, largely from Centenary church, and if there had been the least suspicion of harm in singing on the Opera House stage a prominent Baptist would not have allowed his daughter to take part."

Another chaperone said in all her experiences at similar functions, at dances, excursions, etc., she never had the pleasure of officiating at a better ordered or more carefully conducted affair. The men were ideal gentlemen the young ladies were perfect young ladies. Nothing was said, done, or suggested to jar the sensibilities of the most exacting. It was really an injustice Rev. Mr. Sellar had done, and he would no doubt find this out and modify his statements.—St. John Star.

CHARLOTTETOWN AND PICTOU.

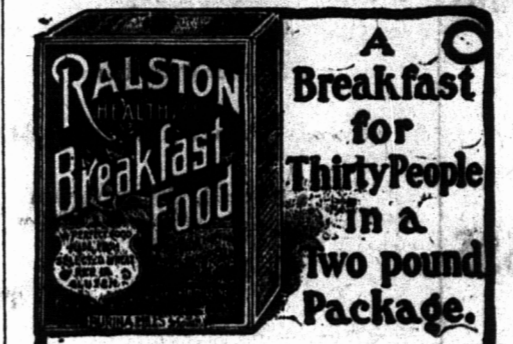
On and after Friday, the 7th Dec. the steamer Princess will leave Charlottetown for Pictou at 10 o'clock a. m. instead of seven.

A PROCLAMATION
By His Honour PETER ADOLPHUS MCINTYRE, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Prince Edward Island, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, the Legislative Assembly of this Province stands prorogued until Tuesday, the Eighteenth day of December, next.

I have thought fit, by and with the advice and consent of Her Majesty's Executive Council of this Province, to dissolve the said Legislative Assembly, and the same is hereby dissolved accordingly.

And I do hereby give notice to the members for the several Electoral Districts and Towns and Royalities, within the said Province that they are hereby discharged from further attendance in the said Legislative Assembly.

And I do further declare that I have given orders, that Writs calling a Legislative Assembly be issued in due form, the said Writs to bear date the Fourteenth day of November, instant, and to be returnable on Wednesday, the second day of January, A. D. 1901, of which all persons concerned, are required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my hand and the Great Seal of this Province, at Charlottetown, in the said Province, this Thirteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred, and in the Sixty-fourth year of Her Majesty's Reign.
