The Apostles were commanded to carry in Jerusalem until they would be ended with power from God. Mr. Westaway stated that baptism, one of the ordinances of the church, can only be administered by the church and that radio cannot provide the ordinances of the church for its members. The need of the church is universal for all men are seeking for peace of mind or heart. In conclusion he stated that this program carried out will be honored by the presence of Christ in His Church. "Lo, I am with you always."

being installed is the only one of its kind in Canada. Designed by Ottawa engineers from a system in use in Scotland, it consists of huge crossed steel girders and stanchions side by side to form a buffer wall extending from the landing apron to the outer end of the pier. To each of these reinforced piles a series of coiled steel springs, three inches in diameter, are heavily bolted and extend some distance below the water line. Covering this tender system is a reinforced wall of heavy planking forming the outer wall against which the ferry docks.

Extending the entire length of the pier on the south, a high concrete sea wall has been erected rising about ten feet above the level of the pier. Throughout the entire length of this wall a tunnel runs where cable and other equipment may be stored.

Ice Barrier To Be Built

In order to provide better parking facilities during the winter months an ice barrier, or wing, will be constructed at the end of the pier extending out into the channel. The contract for the construction of this work is let to the Canada Dredge and Dock Company.

The peak number of men employed by the Borden contract by the company was 140 men with an average payroll of \$35,000 monthly. At present about 85 men are employed with the payroll amounting to \$20,000.

When the work is completed all the company buildings will be disposed of very easily. Already one of the larger buildings has been spoken for to be used as a curling rink in Borden.

A temporary railway line has been constructed during the past year which branches off from the main line and runs to the north side of the pier. When all the work has been completed on the main pier and the passengers may disembark as formerly on the south side, this temporary line will be taken up and considerable filling in work will be done to provide for the erection of an up-to-date comfort station.

Already some of the material for the proposed station is stored on the pier in preparation for this greatly needed convenience. The erection of this station will not be done by the Foundation, Maritime or Ltd., but presumably by the C.N.R. It is hoped to have it completed by next spring.
