Peace Has Come
to Italian People

ROME, Sept. 7.—Fascisti and So-
cialists, after months of guerilla
warfare, have signed an agreement
to abstain from fighting and have
constituted, in cases of new dis-
putes, "a court of last resort"
whose judgments shall be final.
Meanwhile, there are occasional
skirmishes, but peace has practi-
cally come to terrorized Italy.

The court consists of one arbi-
ter, Enrico De Nicola, president
of the Chamber of Deputies, who
is clothed with supreme power in
the settlement of disputes between
the two factions. De Nicola was
elected to the speakership of the
Chamber at the beginning of this
session by a practically unani-
mous vote. He has a nationally
known reputation for fairness. In
his inaugural address he brought
the House to its feet. Fascisti vy-
ing with Socialists and Commu-
nists to applaud his words.

According to the agreement
each side purposes to discipline
its own members and to be re-
sponsible for their conduct, inflic-
ting their own penalties for infra-
ctions of the peace pact. The re-
turn of all "the trophies of war"
is demanded. During the hostil-
ties, the Fascisti commandeered
and captured all kinds of Socialist
arms, emblems, office furniture,
seals, record books and thousands
of members' cards.

During the strike, the Fascisti
also had forced and Socialist to
resign their positions. Now they
may return to work in return for
the promise that they will in no
way interfere with the patriotic pro-
paganda promulgated by the Fas-
cisti and will pay the respect due
the Italian flag.

The Fascisti succeeded in the
negotiations in persuading the
Socialists to disown the organiza-
tion of militant radicals known as
"Aditi del Popolo," who have
been ambushing innocent travel-
ers as well as Fascisti. Several
deaths and many wounded have
been the toll of these ambushed
parties. The Government is
using every means to rid the
country districts of them. Strong

HOW A LINER WAS ARRESTED
LONDON, Sept. 7.—An amusing
story was told today how the Uni-
ted States liner George Washington,
ton, former President Wilson's
peace ship, was arrested for a debt
of \$20,000 when she arrived in
Plymouth recently on her first
passenger trip and how Washing-
ton paid her debt and got her out
of prison. When the Washington
ton smashed into the Folkestone
docks. Ever since the dock
company has been trying to col-
lect money from various depart-
ments of the United States Gov-
ernment.
Though the validity of the claim
was never disputed, the company
could not get payment. Dock of-
ficials bided their time. When the
George Washington arrived at
Plymouth they "labeled" her un-
der the maritime law for the
amount due. This meant she
could not leave port until the mo-
ney was paid, which was highly
inconvenient for the ship, as she
had a lot of passengers for Ches-
ter and London.
The American company—operat-
ing the ship naturally refused to
pay the money and applied to the

state department which called

Reparations
Coming In
NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—Gold coin
bullion and silver bars having an
estimated value of \$8,000,000 were
received at this port today from
Germany, France, Turkey, Egypt
and the Latin American countries.
German Reichsbank forwarded ap-
proximately \$3,000,000. The Feder-
al Reserve Bank presumably has
connections with further German re-
parations obligations.
