#### THE EXPERT SAY--

OTTAWA, Sept. 25. — (CP)—Father may growl when Junior wants the car to take his "date" dancing; mother may criticize Susie for day-dreaming—but when it comes to dealing with members of the jute-box brigade, health and welfare department officials have a few "do's and don'ts" for parents.

These experts admit that the teen-ager is "a peculiarly difficult individual to manage," but at the same time parents could make life easier for themselves, and the adolescents as well, if they tried to be a little more understanding.

Granted that it's difficult at times to tolerate the "know-it-all" attitude of the average teen-ager, but a parent should realize that the independent phase is natural if the child is to develop into a self-reliant, responsible person.

He's at the age when he questions everything from religious observances to the best way of meeting this phase is not with arbitrary authority, nor even with reasonable arguments if presented in an overwhelming broadside, say department officials.

"Present it with just enough reasonable agreement to set him thinking again."

Then again, he's at the age when he needs friends most of all. Neither the young child, who gets most of his emotional satisfaction within the family, nor the adult whose philosophy of life carries him over many difficulties, has need for friends to the same extent as the adolescent.

When it comes to the decision of a career, a job—part-time or during school holidays—often is useful as an indicator of the type of vocation the adolescent should follow, suggest health department officials. In this field the parent should "tread with much circumspection," guiding himself by the aptitudes of the child, not by his own wishes.

Play is important in growing up, and active sports are useful for all adolescents, the experts agree. They improve muscular co-ordination and posture, prevent day-dreaming, and serve generally as a means of working off energy.

Sex instruction, of utmost importance at this time of life, should be given in a factual way, and unemotionally.

"It should best be given privately by the parent or by some older person in whom the adolescent has confidence," say health officials.

Habits which last a lifetime are formed in childhood and hence there's nothing like a good set of living habits to start a youngster on the right road. Health department officials say training given the infant in eating, sleeping, and elimination is important not only for these functions themselves, but also for the social attitudes he incidentally acquires, and which he uses in the ever-widening environment he meets as the years roll by. Examples set by parents and other children in the family, and the way in which the child meets his simple problems, are determining influences in how he will meet problems complex society will later impose upon him.
