OTTAWA, Oct. 5 - (CP) - Finance Minister Isley announced in the Commons today that the coupon values of most of the cooked meats and some of the uncooked meats will be revised this week but at the same time warned that over-all consumption still must be kept within the target of 130 to 135 pounds per person per year.
