I saw the girls, I told nobody. I had no conversation with Mrs. McCloskey about the goods. I didn't see any in her house. I work at Davis & Fraser. I go to McCloskey's about once a week. I was there yesterday. I was subpoenaed on the case. Mrs. McCloskey spoke to me about the goods Edmund Byers had for sale. That was on the 8th—the second time I went in. She didn't tell me she had the stuff hidden in the banking. Davis & Fraser lost a quarter of beef. It was tubercular beef. Someone broke in there. She wasn't speaking to me about the beef. I don't know anything about the disappearance of the beef. I have been working at Davis & Fraser's going of three years...

Cross-examined. I don't know the fellow who was with Byers. I don't know whether he lives in town or not. I don't remember seeing him before. I go to McCloskey's about twice a week. I used to go to McDonald's for a drink of beer. I haven't been at McDonald's for the last couple of months since they stopped making beer. I never went with Joey McDonald. I was in when the place was raided. Joey McDonald was there when a raid was made. I was not there the night of Simon McDonald's wake. I was there four or five times when it was raided. I don't know what kind of beer it was. We pay 25 cts a quart. I wouldn't say it was home brew. I would say it was a mixture. You could taste molasses off it. There was no head on it. It was flat. Henry Laughran, I work at Police Officer Walker's. I remember Sunday, May 8th. I was at 9:30 mass that morning. After that I went to a boarding house for Elmer Gauthier and Vital Gauthier, brothers. We left there and went to McCloskey's between 11:30 and 12:30. We went in and Jas. Gormley, Jack Gills and Bill Power were there. We spoke to them. I was in there about half an hour or so. One of the Gauthier boys is now in Free-town working on a farm, the other (Vital) is teaching school around the Palmer Road. I saw nobody else in McCloskey's. I know Jas. Gormley the prisoner...

Cross-examined. My home is No. 11 Lower Water St. I do not go to McCloskey's. I was there before a year ago. Officer Dominic Doyle. I remember Sunday, May 8th. I was at 11 o'clock mass. I sat at a table by the door. I didn't see Byers there. I didn't hear Byers' evidence. I saw Byers in Church before. I have seen him standing inside the doors. I didn't see him there Sunday, May 8th. There were about twenty standing. I was there all the time. Cross-examined. I would say Byers wasn't at the door last Sunday at 7 o'clock mass. I didn't see you Mr. Johnston at the door. I wouldn't swear you Mr. Johnston, were not in Church. I don't remember having seen Byers there on Sunday, May 8th at the door. To Mr. Gaudet. We have our time on record in the station. On Sunday, May 8th I was in the station from 1-2. Officer Higgins and Sgt. McNis was on duty that day. Allan McNis goes to dinner between 1-2. Officer Watson Higgins. On Sunday May 8th, between one and two o'clock I have a record of my movements made by myself which shows that I was on patrol between one and two. There was nobody with me for the first half hour - I was on Kent St., Euston St., and Queen St. - from Euston St. to the Police Station on Queen St. Cross-examined. Those entries are generally correct. I searched Mrs. McCloskey's banking the day of the first preliminary hearing. I searched with a bar and shovel. There was a crust all over the ashes...

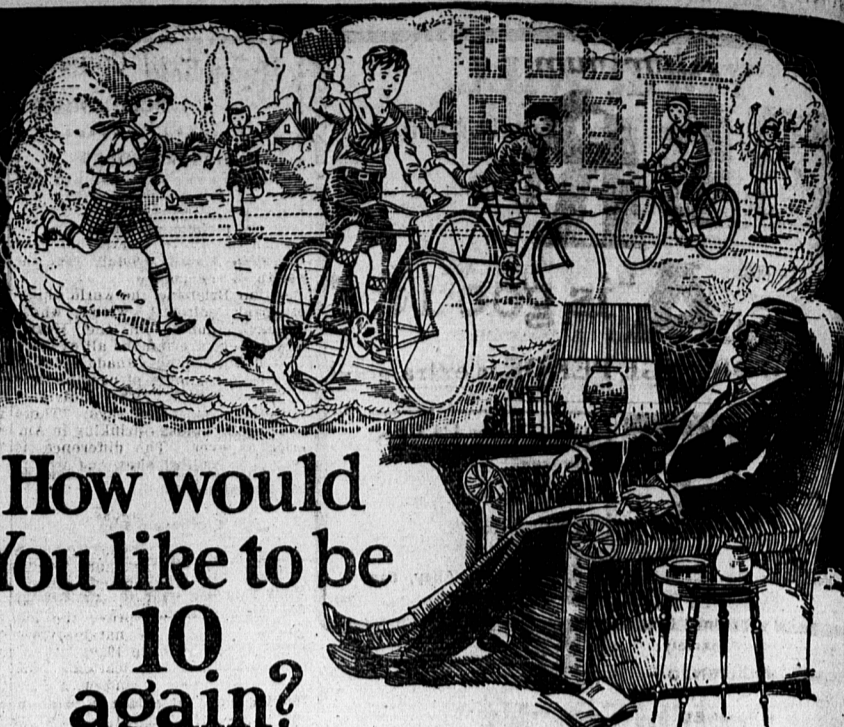
Dr. T. B. Acker of Halifax arrived on the Island last evening to conduct clinics for crippled children for the Red Cross Society.

erland and Weymouth. Our house is on the corner of Sydney and Cumberland St. My grandmother lives in the other end of the house. We went down Cumberland and up Dorchester. We always go that way. Byers was at the door only a few minutes. Then he went up Dorchester. We were right behind them. I don't know the other fellow. He was a white man. I can't say for sure whether I saw him before or not. I was just putting the door on when they came to the door. I have been at McCloskey's. I have not been there ten times in my life. I was there about a month ago. Mrs. McCloskey never spoke to me of this affair or Mr. McCloskey. She sent no word to me or to her. I have not been speaking to Jack Marr. The last time I saw him to speak to him or Jack Coughlin, was when he said "Hello". We got our milk sometimes at South's—sometimes on Sunday. His first name is Thomas. We didn't try to get milk there that Sunday. I can't tell why I didn't go there for milk that morning. There is one clock in the house. It is in the kitchen. We had two clocks. My brother Jack took one to the factory the other day. Esther McDonald, daughter of Mrs. Mary Ann McDonald, 297 Sydney St. "I remember Sunday, May 8th. That's about three weeks ago. This is the 13th of June. I know Edmund Byers. I think he came that day on Sunday to our house about eleven o'clock with some one else. I don't know who he was, I saw him. He was a short fellow. I went to the door. They were asking for beer. I told them Mrs. McCloskey would have some. They went away then. They went down Cumberland and up Dorchester. My sister and I were behind them going for milk. Byers went into McCloskey's, on Dorchester St. The other fellow went on towards the Station. We were about the length of this room behind them. I sometimes speak to Byers on the street—not very often. Cross-examined. I heard Mac say it was just eleven o'clock. I didn't look at the clock. She took the potatoes off at twelve o'clock. I heard the clock strike twelve. I said eleven o'clock. The clock is in the kitchen. I wasn't looking at the clock. I looked at the clock when it was striking twelve. I was dressing myself. I got up about 10:30. She got up about 9:30 or 10. I had my breakfast as soon as I got up. I got my own breakfast. My sister had stalled to eat the dinner before I finished breakfast. On the following Sunday I was doing about this. I didn't tell the girls...

much of anything. I don't know what time I put on the potatoes or took them off that Sunday. I saw a Byers girl—Nellie Byers—Sunday 15th. She came to our place about 2:30. We went for a walk up town. We were walking all the time from 2:30—4:30. That was the Sunday after I saw Byers at our place. On Sunday, May 1st. I don't remember where I was. I don't know whether I was home or not. I was up town that night. I was out with the Byers girl again—Peter Byers' daughter. I was with her at night. My sister was home that night also. My mother. On 15th May my mother was home. I am eighteen years of age. I don't think I ever saw the fellow who was with Byers before. He was a young man and short. The both of us went for the milk. We just thought we would take a walk over to Michel's to get it. I thought that I spoke to Mrs. McCloskey over a month ago. I never spoke to a soul about seeing these men. Watson Higgins was talking to us Saturday night and we came up this morning. He didn't tell me to swear to what my sister was saying. He saw us Saturday night on the corner. I never spoke to any one about meeting these men that morning. I got out of jail about the last of April. I was put in for nothing. Harold Donovan convicted me. I wasn't up to court. I was in jail about a month. So was my sister at the same time and for the same thing. The clock strikes the hour. There is a wooden frame to it. We have it about a year now. John Mahar, 23 Edward St., meat cutter. "I remember Sunday, May 8th. I was at church that day in the forenoon at 9:30 mass. After church I went to McCloskey's. I was with John Coughlin. We went down about 10:30. We went through the Square, down Grafton, then Cumberland and Edward Gallant and Mrs. McCloskey were there. We stayed there about 5 minutes while drinking a quart of beer. We left then. I know Edmund Byers. I saw him that day, passing Griffins on the corner of Weymouth and Dorchester Streets, about a quarter to eleven. I was standing on the corner. It was after we went into McCloskey. Byers was going when he passed us. He was alone towards the Station. I saw him go into McCloskey's. I saw him come out. He was in there about five or ten minutes. When he came out he came up Dorchester and down Weymouth. He came out between 10:30 and 11 o'clock. I was at McCloskey's again that day. I know Jas. Gormley to see him. I didn't see him there. Cross-examined. I go to McCloskey's once in a while. I was there twice between 10:30 and 11 o'clock. Coughlin was with me at both times. We got beer. I paid 25 cents a quart for it. I would call it molasses and water but they call it beer. The first time I went in Goldie Carr and Edward Gallant were there. They went out when we were drinking the quart. I paid 25 cents the first time. The second quart I contributed 10 cents and Jack Coughlin 10 cents also. Mrs. McCloskey served it. She went outside to get it. It was not intoxicating. I didn't tell officer Higgins following Sunday I was doing about this. I didn't tell the girls...
