ISLAND ATHLETES IN THE WAR
—P. E. Island Athletes in the Great War, is the title of a bright breezy little volume written and published by Mr. James Coyle, foreman of the mechanical department of the Patriot. Mr. Coyle who is himself an old-time football enthusiast is deserving of hearty congratulations indeed on his enterprise in getting out such a useful compendium of valuable information concerning so many of the stalwart young sons of the Island Province who so gallantly responded when the call of duty came, putting aside their cherished contests on the fields of rivalry to take up the sterner conflicts in the great battle for the preservation of the world's liberty. In compiling a list of the Island boys whose names were familiar in the annals of amateur athletics in the Province and who have gone forth embued with the "play the game" spirit it acquired no doubt to a large degree in those strenuous contests of pre-war days, Mr. Coyle has indeed performed a useful service. The booklet is copiously illustrated with splendid portraits of those sons of Abegweit who have shed lustre on their Island home. Some of these have laid down their lives on the field of honor; many have suffered wounds and disablement and the heroism and devotion to duty of quite a number has won for them recognition in the form of medals and decorations from the heads of nations. The book contains a lengthy and inspiring introduction reminiscent of the by-gone days when these Heroes helped to make life at home more interesting and stimulating. The book brings up the thought: what are the boys of today doing to keep alive the athletic fires which were kindled by the boys of other days? Football and cricket, baseball and hockey, running and jumping, are these to give way to automobile racing and cigarette smoking? It is to be hoped Mr. Coyle's interesting and valuable work will cause some thinking to be done and result in the awakening of the spirit for good clean athletics in the province. The book it is hoped will meet with a good demand from the public. It is on sale at the book-stores. A proportion of the proceeds go to patriotic purposes—the purchase of comforts for the boys "over there."

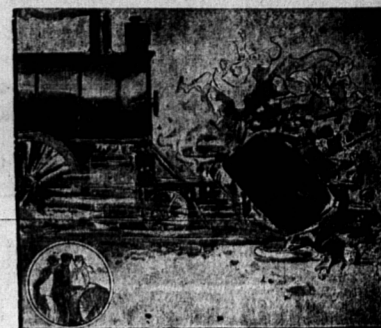
