THE WEATHER.—Yesterday's weather was fine and cold. There was bright sunshine for several hours. The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 20 degrees above zero, in comparison with sixteen above, the lowest registered on the previous day. At 9 a. m. yesterday the thermometer recorded seventeen degrees above; at 9 p. m. eighteen degrees above.

The tide will be high this afternoon at 12.39 and tomorrow 1.22; it will be high tonight at 11.35 and tomorrow at 12.

The sun sets this afternoon at 4.24 and tomorrow at 4.25; it rises tomorrow morning at 7.42 and Wednesday at 7.42.

The first quarter of the new moon will be on Sunday, Jan. 4th at 8.09 a. m.

## STEFANSSON PARTY SAFE IN ICE PACK

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 26—Dr. R. M. Anderson, chief anthropologist with the Stefansson expedition, reported to George J. Desbarats, deputy minister of naval affairs, yesterday, that all the scientists and members of the crews of the Alaska and Mary Sachs, two of the explorer's vessels, are safe and well in winter quarters at Collinson Point, 50 miles from Flaxman Island, in the Arctic Circle.

The report arrived by mail contrary to recent despatches from Seattle, that neither of the two vessels is damaged to any extent. The Mary Sachs was caught in the ice packs last September, but can be easily repaired.

Dr. Anderson reports last having seen the Karluk in an ice pack near Point Barrow on Aug. 19.

The mail received was despatched from Collinson Point on Oct. 13, by runner to Circle City, Alaska, and thence it was sent South by steamer.

The Mary Sachs, with Kenneth Chapman, a geologist, in charge, and the Alaska, reached Collinson Point on Sept. 27, and decided to winter there.

OF SPECIAL INTEREST. MONCTON, December 25.—Three I.C.R. trainmen, a baggage master and two brakemen, running on the express train between Moncton and St. John, were arrested by the I. C. R. police, charged with stealing a quantity of jewelry and other goods from the valises belonging to passengers, which had been placed in their care. Before the arrests were made, a search instituted by the police resulted in the finding of part of the missing goods on the premises of one of the men. The thefts are alleged to have covered a considerable time past, and were very cleverly planned and executed. The police say that it is one of the biggest steals in the history of the I. C. R.

As stated above, the men were arrested, and brought to the city police station where a formal charge was placed against them by Chief Inspector A. J. Tingley. The cases came up before Judge W. A. McDougall at 2.30 this afternoon.

Among the articles stolen were a gold necklace, set with pearls, a silk dress, a silk handbag, and other goods of a like nature.

The loss of the baggage was reported on Friday between St. John and Moncton, were made by Mrs. Hilyard, of Dalhousie, and Mrs. Lounsbury, of St. John and Dalhousie. It was at first thought that the baggage had been opened at Dalhousie Junction, but later developments pointed to the St. John end of the road. Watch was kept on suspected parties, and it became particularly certain that employees on a certain express train were responsible. A peculiar co-incidence in connection with the case was that both thefts took place on Saturday, the 6th and 13th. A search warrant was obtained and some of the stolen goods were found on the premises of one of the

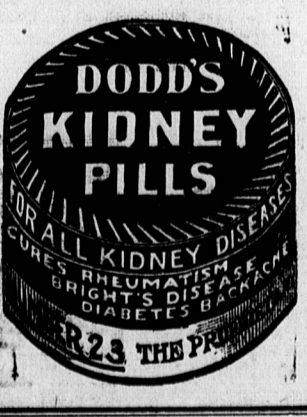
