A ROYAL FAREWELL

Lieut. McDonald Met by His Fellow Officers.

PRESENTATIONS MADE

By Officers, Bar and Citizens - Patriotic Addresses Delivered.

Royal indeed was the farewell tendered Lieut. John A. McDonald who leaves tonight for the front.

Last night the Council Chamber was crowded with his fellow officers and a number of citizens attended to do him honor.

His Worship Mayor Warburton said as it was a military meeting he asked Colonel Moore to take the chair.

In opening the meeting Col. Moore delivered an excellent address brimming over with patriotism. In the course of his remarks he said that it afforded him a great deal of pleasure to see such a gathering of the officers of the militia. "We are here to do honor to Lieut. McDonald who has been selected for service in South Africa. We feel that the selection of Lieut. McDonald is an additional honor.

"Today such positions are coveted and sought after by the staff officers of the country. His comrades in arms can feel that he will do honor to his corps, to the Province and to the Empire. Lieut. McDonald leaves us tomorrow for the scene of conflict. We will rejoice in his successes and mourn in his reverses and in case of disaster our sympathy will go out to him. We will look forward with eager anticipation to his safe return."

Col. Moore then presented Lieut. McDonald with the following address accompanied by a beautiful bracelet watch, revolver, field glasses and purse of fifty dollars, the gifts of his brother officers:—

LIEUT. JOHN A. McDONALD, ADJ. 82ND. BATTALION.

The officers of No. 12 Military District wish to congratulate you on your appointment for active service in South Africa and we present you with the accompanying watch, revolver and field glass as a small reminder of our appreciation and friendship. That you will ever sustain the fair name of your native province there is no doubt in our minds.

Lieut. McDonald in replying to the address said that he supposed his brother officers would not expect him to say very much. He failed to find words to express his appreciation. To receive such evidences of generosity and good will is something that he did not deserve. During his short militia life he had done what he

could. He then referred to his action of volunteering on the first contingent and the disappointment, and when the second contingent was talked of he again asked for a position, but at a time when his hopes of a place had almost faded he received the present appointment. In South Africa he would do his best to bring honor to P. E. Island and to the Empire.

Mr. Arthur Peters, M. L. A., said that he personally had a great appreciation for Lieut. McDonald. He had called upon a large number of citizens and they were all pleased to contribute. He knew Mr. McDonald would fill the position with honor. Mr. Ings and himself had gone around and they found a generous response and 100 dollars had been cheerfully given, which on behalf of the bar and citizens he had the honor to present to Lieut. McDonald.

Lieut. McDonald thanked the donors and said that he appreciated the gift very much, and trusted that he would be able to prove himself worthy of the confidence placed in him. Short addresses were then delivered by Col. Dougherty, Col. Longworth, Surgeon Major Warburton, and J. P. Tanton after which all joined hands, and while standing in a circle, Auld Lang Syne was sung, which was followed by three cheers and a tiger for Lieut. McDonald, and three cheers and a tiger for Her Majesty the Queen.

She leaves two daughters, one son, Mr. Malcolm McDonald of Grand View, the daughters are Mrs. Donald Nicholson and Mrs. Charles McLaughlin of Pleasant Valley.—the latter who took care of her in her last days, to mourn, but not as those without hope, for she lived a consistent Christian life, and died trusting in the merits of a crucified Redeemer. "Blessed are the dead that die Lord, yet saith the Spirit for they rest from their labor and their works do follow them."
