Rev. Dr. Hunt, of King's College, is spending Christmas at his home in St. Eleanors. He officiated at the 11 o'clock service in St. Peter's on Christmas Day.

Mr. Rodk. A. McDonald, employed in the Car Works at Trenton, N. S., arrived in the city on Saturday night to spend two weeks vacation at his home in Mount Stewart.

Mr. John F. McDonald, of New Harmony, returned Saturday night from Trenton, N. S., where he had gone to settle the affairs of his son who worked at the car shops and who died there recently.

Wins Military Medal

Corporal Russell Stewart son of Mr. Daniel Stewart of Southport, He enlisted on the day war was declared, went to Canada with the first artillery detachment from Charlottetown and later went overseas with the 2nd Heavy Battery. He has therefore been in the war since the beginning and has had a long service in France. Particulars of why he has won the military medal are not yet to hand, but there is not the slightest doubt that he has gallantly won this great honour.

His father recently received a letter from him dated "Huy, Belgium, Dec. 2nd." He states that although the war is over, they are still busy with polishing guns and equipment looking after the horses, etc. They have been doing some hard marching in their last position before the armistice was signed they were about 17 kilometres from Mons. From there they went to Genappes about 4 kilos distant. They had then a three days forced march which landed them at Namur where they rested a day. In his letter he said they would leave on a 40 kilometre trip and a few more days would take them to their destination, somewhere on the Rhine. Corporal Stewart expected it would be some months before they sailed for home. He has a brother William, also in the service. He left here with the 5th Siege Battery, now the 8th.

Russell writes that his battery was brigaded with him at the start-out so that he saw him almost every day on the route. He is feeling fine having recovered from the effects of being gassed and wounded in July 1917, when so many men of the Battery were put out of commission. Corporal Stewart also writes that when the armistice was signed the people went wild in England and Paris. The troops received a great welcome from the people of France and in France where he was wounded and arrived home about three weeks ago and enjoyed his Christmas dinner Paris a visit before he leaves for home. Mr. Daniel Stewart has three sons in the war; in addition to the two above mentioned, the third being A. L. Stewart, who enlisted in the 2nd Heavy Battery and spent four years in it has received the Military Medal.
