FARM NOTES

Reopening of the whole question of the relative authority of Federal and Provincial Governments over water powers on navigable streams is likely to follow parliamentary investigation of the financial structure of Beauharnois Power Corporation. The company now has authority to divert 40,000 cubic feet per second at Beauharnois between Lake St. Louis and Lake St. Francis on the St. Lawrence river and is about to seek approval by the Dominion of withdrawal rights of 30,000 additional cubic feet already sanctioned by Quebec.
 At one period, the King Government contended that power rights on navigable waters were vested in the Dominion. The claim was contested by Ontario and Quebec and a decision of the Supreme Court of Canada failed to finally dispose of the matter. Shortly afterwards Quebec province gave Beauharnois its authority and the then Federal government approved the plans for the work as not interfering with the rights of navigation.
 A year ago the whole situation was brought dramatically to the attention of parliament with the claim that the promoters—who had a very limited cash investment in proportion to the cost of the enterprise, which was financed by a bond and preferential stock issue—had made themselves a present of stocks of a face value of some hundred million dollars and that the ultimate scheme would raise this to probably three hundred millions. By comparison it made all other Canadian promotional enterprises look insignificant in the return it promised those influential enough to put it across. The demand was then made that the whole circumstances be fully investigated and Mr. Bennett as leader of the Opposition, expressed the view that if the circumstances were as represented, complete inquiry was desirable.
 The matter was raised again a few days ago by the U.F.A. leader, Robert Gardiner, who insisted the company had broken its lease and that it was still within the power of the Dominion to secure return of rights which he computed to have a value of hundreds of millions. Mr. Bennett agreed that the whole issue be referred to a committee of the House for investigation and this is now being done. The Prime Minister pointed out that

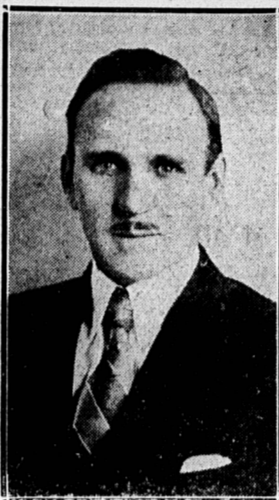
minent counsel advised him that the power rights did not belong to the Dominion.

The inquiry is likely to throw up a considerable amount of mud as the suggestion has been made that certain members of Parliament were financially interested in the project. Mr. Gardiner charged that Senator W. L. McDougald of Montreal, former chairman of the Montreal Harbor Commission and a most intimate friend of Mr. King was paid \$780,000 and 208,000 class A common shares for his interest in the old company. These securities, according to the company prospectus, Mr. Gardiner said, were worth \$30,000,000, though the present market price is about \$1,456,000. Other members of both Houses are said to have been retained in a legal capacity by the power company and Mr. Gardiner said men behind the company had been charged with attempting to corrupt the administration of justice in Quebec.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE FRUIT BRANCH RECOMMEND GRADE FOR FIELD RHUBARB

Canada No. 1 shall consist of stems showing not less than one-third red colour, and not less than five-eighths of an inch diameter at or near the butt end, fresh, not wilted, free from disease, insect and other pest, well trimmed, free from dirt, trimmings and other foreign matter, and well packed.
 In order to allow for variations incidental to commercial grading and handling, five per cent by weight may be below the minimum size, and in addition five per cent by weight may be below the remaining requirements of the grade, but not more than one per cent by weight may be affected with decay.
Standard Container
 The container for graded field rhubarb shall be constructed of sound materials, clean and of such size to hold not less than 50 pounds gross, clearly marked on the side or end with the name and address of packer or shipper, the name and grade of contents and the gross weight when packed.
Definitions
 "Well trimmed" means that the butt shall be left uncut with the skin removed, and the top with slight prong, not exceeding one inch and in the event of stick being too long for container the leaf end only to be cut.
 "Well packed" means that the stems shall be placed one way in the box, that is either all across or lengthwise of the box.

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
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
