MISSION BAND SOCIAL AT MONTROSE.—The Grierson Mission Band, Montrose, held an ice cream social, at the manse, last Saturday afternoon, 1st inst. There was a good attendance of young people and their friends, and the affair passed off quite pleasantly. After enjoying a number of out-door games the company assembled in the manse parlor, where a pleasant hour was spent in music, recitation, etc. Mrs. D. Marchbanks presiding at the piano. At the close a short address was given by the pastor, in which particular reference was made to the great work being done by our missionary, Dr. Grierson and his associates in far-distant Korea. Mr. D. Gordon, Mr. L. H. McLeod, elders of the congregation, and Mrs. Jas. Hardy, President of the Society, also very suitably addressed the children. A snug little sum in aid of the Korea Mission was realized.

EASTERN NOTES.—The thunder storm of Sunday the 28th, so wide spread in its area and destructive in its work was severely felt here. It was the worst thunder and lightning that ever visited us, and though the destruction of property was small the number of trees shattered by the electric fluid, many of them in the vicinity of buildings, at the proximity of the storm cloud and the nearness of the danger. In the grove surrounding the residence of John L. McLeod, Red Point, five trees were shattered, some of them nearly reduced to kindling wood. The barns of Joseph McLellan and on the estate of the late John McLellan, Little Harbor, were demolished, but by the wind not the lightning. A regular cyclone left the thunder cloud and swept over the farms while nothing more than the ordinary breeze was blowing a few hundreds yards on each side. The sky as seen through the storm clouds, was of a peculiar hue, two different strata of the atmosphere appeared to be highly charged with electricity, the upper one discharging its surplus into the air, the lower one right over our heads and close at that, plainly imparting its destructive elements to the earth around us, and that too close for comfort and philosophic observation, while the incessant crashing and rolling of thunder mingled with a deluge of water, flooding the roads and the fields to an unusual depth, produced a condition of affairs never seen here, and not a few supposed that Gabriel was about to sound the last emble.—The Caledonian games at Souris attracted a number of the people from this section, and the descendants of MacCallum Moore, the Lords of the Isles, the heirs of Keppoch, of Clanronald and Glengarry, of Macdonald of Sleat and McLean of Mull, Stewart of Appin, and Cameron of Lochiel, the sons of McPherson and McIntosh, of Mackay and McLeod met in friendly intercourse and feats of strength and athletic skill in striking contrast to the meeting their forefathers had in the

"Land of green heath and shaggy wood
