### THE U. S. PRESIDENCY.

The announcement that Governor Hughes will be a candidate for the Republican nomination for the Presidency comes in the way of disturbance to President Roosevelt's plans. With Hughes before the national convention supported by the New York delegation almost anything may be possible. Already the Taft boom, such as it was, is somewhat shaken by the announcement of so formidable a rival, but with his strong backing from the White House Mr. Taft may count upon a strong support in the convention when it meets.

There are some symptoms of impatience over President Roosevelt's too open and active promotion of the candidature of Taft. The feeling is that the national choice should remain free and that it is neither in the best taste nor in the true interests of the nation that an outgoing President shall desire or be permitted to choose his successor. This attitude of the President operates as a sort of two edged sword. His large influence in the nation is at first hand a source of strength to Mr. Taft's candidature, but pushed too far it carries with it an element of conspicuous weakness.

Both Secretary Taft and Governor Hughes are able, reputable and popular men of clean record, either of them strong enough in will to take his own course if once elevated to the Presidential chair. Mr. Hughes certainly would not and Mr. Taft probably would not submit to Mr. Roosevelt's control if once elected. None the less Mr. Roosevelt's evident desire that his successor shall owe his selection by the party convention and his election by the people afterward to the Roosevelt influence in the party and the nation is a sufficient indication that the present incumbent of the White House desires to control in large measure the policy of the incoming President.

In the Democratic party Mr. Bryan is the only leader in sight with any large following and it is generally believed that he will secure his nomination. From the Canadian viewpoint this is not unsatisfactory. In point of character and ability any one of the three aspirants above named might be considered well qualified for the highest position in the Republic. Whether or not the time has come for the Democratic party to elect the next President is a matter which the year will determine, but if it should prove so Mr. Bryan would be expected to fill the position with honor and credit.

### TRANSPORTATION NEEDS.

Mr. Butler, Deputy Minister of Railways in his annual report on Railway Statistics uses the following words:

"The problems of transportation rise above all others in importance, as bearing directly on the commercial life of the nation. All production, pastoral and industrial, with the labor involved, would practically cease if adequate marketing facilities were withdrawn which is only another way of saying that the trade of the country is dependent upon the operation of railways. Scarcely less a plorable would be the position of the Dominion having regard to the future, if railway construction and betterments should be indefinitely suspended."

The truth is so forcibly stated by Mr. Butler will not be challenged. They

are not debatable. They are self-evident truths. And every sentence and every line in the statement quoted is an irrefragable argument in favor of the Prince Edward Island Tunnel. On the construction of that work our agricultural and industrial life depends. Without it this Province is and will remain during five months of the twelve without adequate marketing facilities. Our case is doubly the stronger from the fact that to our urgent necessity is added the binding obligation, the treaty compact of the Dominion, to supply and maintain efficient continuous communication with the mainland. Truly "this problem rises above all others in importance."

Toronto is a licence town. On Christmas day there were thirty four arrests for drunkenness. During the year there were 8,018 arrests for drunkenness, or over twenty two per day on an average. But on New Year's day the bars were closed, that being election day and there was not a single arrest. A good argument for closing the bars and keeping them closed all the time.

We boast of Canadian trade which last year reached the big total of \$658,599,974 in imports and exports. But the volume of British trade is enormously greater. Last year the added imports and exports of the British Isles was \$5,800,000,000, or nearly nine times as great as the total of British trade in two years (1901 and 1902) was \$885,000,000, or near total trade of Canada. The increase by one third more than the total trade of Canada last year. Canada is by no means the only country that is increasing in trade in these booming times.

### In deepening slumber lie?

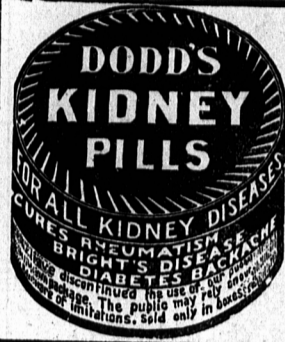
And while you wait, through the crumbling gate Comes Love, with softened tread, And looks in your face with the sad-sending grace Of glad days long since dead.

### Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any one numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 24, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section (60 s. more or less.

Applications for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Land Agency or Subagency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of any intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following conditions: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desire perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead, or any other land which will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with that of his mother.

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than five miles in a straight line, or exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the agent for the district of such intention.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for a patent.
