Greco and Gagnier Ordered to Defend Titles By Nov. 1

MONTEREAL, Aug. 27 (CP) — Featherweight champion Hubert Gagnier of Quebec City and welterweight champion Johnny Greco of Montreal have been ordered by the Canadian Boxing Federation to defend their Canadian titles on or before Nov. 1.

This was the main decision taken yesterday at a closed meeting of the Federation and in lining up the move Lou Alier of Montreal was named logical contender for the featherweight crown and Harry Hurst of Montreal was listed as leading challenger for Greco's title.

The Federation, meeting under the chairmanship of Frank Homan of Montreal, also drew up a revised list of Canadian champions and contenders. The two divisions, the light-heavyweight and flyweight, were left vacant.
