THE FINANCIAL CAPABILITIES OF THE PROVINCE. This ignorance did not deter them from voting their own salary and indemnity increase, EVEN AFTER THE ESTIMATES SHOWING THE EXPECTED RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES HAD BEEN PASSED AND DISPOSED OF BY THE HOUSE.

But when they come to deal with the public, they are not looking for the same density of ignorance from the people. They are busily circulating TAX NOTICES of various descriptions, WHICH THEY ARE ASKING THE PEOPLE TO FILL OUT, AND IN SOME INSTANCES TO SWEAR TO THEIR STATEMENT.

At the session of the House they were quite emphatic in their answers as to the revenue their TAXATION ACTS were going to produce. Now they come in with the practical admission that they were taxing the people right and left in every direction, without the slightest conception as to how much their taxation would realize.

FRANCE UNABLE TO MEET OBLIGATIONS WITHOUT GERMANY

PARIS, Oct. 8.—The French budget for 1921 which will be submitted to the Chamber when Parliament reopens next month will amount to 26,000,000,000 francs as against 21,500,000,000 for 1920. On the other hand, there is to be no extraordinary budget, which for the present year was just over 5,000,000,000 francs for the coming year, as against 20,000,000,000 francs this year.

A special budget summing up the cost of reparations in the liberated area and pensions which the Versailles Treaty enjoins, must be borne by Germany, amounts to 24,000,000,000 francs for the coming year, as against 20,000,000,000 francs this year.

Finance Minister Francois-Marsal lays stress on the elimination of the extraordinary budget which represented expense mostly of the army and navy not voted by Parliament, but his estimates show an army increase of 4,000,000 francs.

It is probable, however, that the Nationalist majority will not raise very serious objections to an expenditure whose most evident purpose is the maintenance of French prestige in the Near East.

The minister hopes that the budget can be met from revenue, which was not the case for the present year. He estimates a return of 40,000,000,000 francs from the war benefits tax on the gross business turnover, but even if he can avoid taking a part of the proceeds of the coming loan to make ends meet—which he was forced to do with the last budget—he will be almost certain to repeat the expedient of reckoning as revenue the proceeds

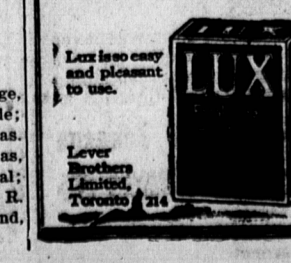

Stock Notes

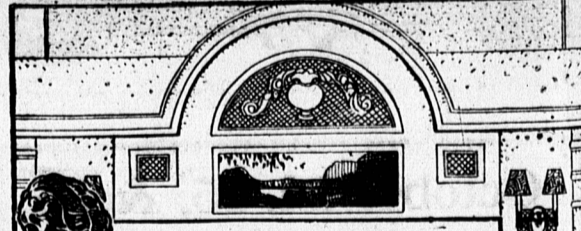
Among the exhibitors of Ayrshire cattle at the Provincial Exhibition held in Charlottetown the name of Mr. Edwin Reid, Sunny Slope Farm, Rollo Bay, P. E. I., may be mentioned as one that helped greatly to make the Ayrshire exhibit the success it was. Mr. Reid showed eight head of cattle that were a credit to the Ayrshire breed. Among the outstanding animals in Mr. Reid's herd may be mentioned Lone Pine Belle. This cow has qualified in the Record of Performance in the two, three and four year old classes, giving as a four year old over 12,000 lbs. of milk in the year. Lone Pine Belle won first in the Special Prize given by the Ayrshire Breeders Association for cows having an official record begun under five years of age. At the head of the herd stands Paul of Ingewood, whose dam, Flossie of Burnbrae, has an official record of 14,416 pounds milk and 590 lbs. butter fat. He is sired by Briery Boy of Spring Bank, a son of Briery 2nd, of Spring Bank, with an official record of 14,131 lbs. milk and 520 lbs. butter fat as a two year old.

Stock Notes

In the junior yearling class, Mr. Reid showed Briery Belle, of Sunny Slope and succeeded in capturing the red ribbon. This is an exceptionally promising young heifer, out of Lone Pine Belle and sired by Paul of Ingewood. This

heifer won the championship for best female, any age at the Georgetown Exhibition this fall. Unfortunately, owing to lack of stabling accommodation at Charlottetown Exhibition, Mr. Reid was obliged to place his herd in horse stalls and consequently did not show up to the best advantage.

However, all who had the privilege of seeing this beautiful herd could not help being convinced that they are Ayrshires of the right sort, the kind that make a good profit for their owner from a production standpoint and can also compete in the showing with the best of the breed.
