Synopsis: Northerly winds off the Gulf of St. Lawrence caused cloud in Cape Breton Tuesday and there were a few snowflakes there. Elsewhere was fine. Temperatures fell below freezing the night before but rose to the high fifties in many places during the afternoon. Similar weather can be expected again on Wednesday over much of the district. However a disturbance moving eastward from the Mississippi valley is likely to cause increasing cloudiness in the southwestern sections during the afternoon.
