NEW YORK, Oct. 6 (AP)—Every day there's a new hero. Yesterday the Yankees' Tommy Henrich ramed a ninth-inning homer into the stands to snare a New York victory, but when the Yanks rallied in the eighth today and put two men on base, "Old Reliable" failed in the clutch.

The 70,033 paid fans saw him run the count to 3-2 after fouling off several pitches, then bloop into the hands of leftfielder Luis Olmo.

John (Beans) Reardon, who started his upspring career with the Western Canada Pro League, had a tough time calling them from behind the plate. Preacher Roe, the Dodger hurler, was really cutting the corners and Vic Raschi was fogging it in there too.

Beans was on top of the play when Gene Henzanski was nipped at the plate in the fourth, trying to score from third on Raschi's slow roller. Gerry Coleman, good-field-no-hit second-sacker for the Yanks, scooped the ball and pegged off balance to Charlie Silvers for the tag.

Big John Mize, who has been bumping along in baseball since 1920, finally made the World Series today. Coming in as a pinch hitter for Charley Silvers in the eighth inning, Mize hit the second pinch for a single. Before you could say "John Robert Mize" he was out of there, with George Starnweiss taking over as his runner.

Lauren Bacall, actress wife of Humphrey Bogart, tried to stand up for the Dodger half of the seventh-inning stretch, but the film "tough guy" promptly pulled her back into her seat.

The demon Dodger statistician, Allan Roth, revealed that Preacher Roe threw 136 pitches in hurrying the 1-0 shutout for Brooklyn. According to the Yankee hitters, approximately 135 were curve balls.

Jackie Robinson Gets Run In Second; Preacher Roe Is Winning Pitcher

YANKEE STADIUM, New York, Oct. 6 (AP)—Elwin (Preacher) Roe, a slight, studious southpaw from Arkansas, gave a magnificent performance under wracking pressure in the late innings today to throttle the Yankees 1-0 and pull his Brooklyn Dodgers even with the New Yorkers in the 1949 World Series at one game apiece.

A crowd of 70,033 packed into the Yankee park witnessed a second thrilling mound duel, this time between Roe and Vic Raschi, the Yankees' big 21-game winner. And for the second day they saw the decision hinge on a single run, Jackie Robinson, the Dodgers' scamping Negro second-baseman, crossed the plate with the big on the Yankees winning the second inning after Jackie had doubled and raced to third on a pop foul.

Elching his way out of trouble in the eighth and ninth frames with a cool and gritty exhibition, Roe became the first Brooklyn hurler to gang up a 1-0 victory over the Yankees in the series. Before retiring for a pinch hitter in the last of the eighth, Raschi gave up six hits, struck out four and issued only one walk, that intentional to the dangerous Roy Campanella, to get out of the second-inning jam.

The Dodgers nicked Joe Page for their seventh hit, a lead-off single into left by Duke Snider. Robinson sacrificed the Duke to second but neither pinch hitter Carl Furillo nor Luis Olmo could knock Joe's stuff past the infield.

The hard-earned Dodger victory makes it almost certain that the Yankees will see some more of the series ends. The Preacher, who needs at least three days of rest, should be ready to go again if the playoff reaches a sixth game on Monday — as it gives every indication of doing.

Tommy Byrne, a skittish southpaw who can be either brilliant or a manager's despair, depending upon whether he has control, is Stengel's choice for tomorrow's contest in Flatbush. Burt Shotton said he will counter either with Rex Barney or Ralph Branca.

Odds Still Favor Yankees

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 6 (AP)—New York still is the favorite to win the World Series, but the odds were trimmed sharply by betting commissioner James J. Carroll after Brooklyn's triumph today.

The odds on the Yankees now are 3 to 4, on the Dodgers 11 to 10. A bettor must put up \$4 to win \$3 on the Yankees winning the championship, but a \$10 bet would win \$11 in the event of a Dodger victory.

The quotations on tomorrow's game make the Yankees slight favorites. New York with Lopat facing Branca, is listed at 4 to 5, and the odds on Brooklyn are even in the event these pitchers start. With Lopat facing Barney, the Yankees are listed at 7 to 10 and the Dodgers at 6 to 5.
