Davies at this present time, having all the qualifications necessary for a cabinet position and so on.

In our opinion, Premier Farquharson's well known ability is much required in the position he holds, at least, until the new legislation begun by him, and now on trial, is made more efficient.

Mr. Horace Haszard being the choice of a great number of the people of that riding, will, we trust, be the choice of the convention, when it takes place. He is a man well qualified for the position. We know whereof we speak, when we say that there is not another man in this Province better informed on trade questions, fisheries, dairy and farming interests in general. No, we cannot spare Premier Farquharson just now.

The West Queen's Seat.

SIR,—The Patriot correspondents in a recent issue "C. A. N." and "New London," can deceive no one. They are evidently hirelings and like faithful journey men unite for a price at the bidding of their superiors. Free men that love their country and are true to the party could not be guilty of the twaddle that appears over their signatures.

Mr. Haszard was first in the field as a candidate and was accepted by leaders of party as a fit person to succeed Sir Louis Davies. And if we mean to keep good faith with each other that in itself is sufficient reason why we should have Mr. Haszard for our candidate and no other. It was weeks after that Mr. Farquharson came on the scene as a possible candidate and we are now coolly requested by the Patriot's correspondents to be false to Mr. Haszard and to accept Mr. Farquharson.

The very suggestion is outrageous. The Patriot's correspondents seem in enmity with every mark of fairplay. Their advice if followed would ruin our party. As far as Dominion politics are concerned both Messrs. Haszard and Farquharson are untried and yet the former has given many indications of the highest order of statesmanship.

The business men of the Province and a large number of my fellow farmers will remember the debt of gratitude we owe Mr. Haszard for zealous, untiring efforts in our behalf as President of the Board of Trade. Without any salary whatever, with no selfish object in view, in good report and bad he stood by the institution and was instrumental in building it up. It became a power for good in this Province, second only to the Dominion Government itself.

For my part I would sooner have as a candidate in Dominion politics one possessing some of the attributes of a statesman (even if he is a new man) than an old politician that is already well provided for. Besides our party can only be kept together by calling in to political life good upright men who are capable and possess statesmanlike qualities.

In the first interview which Mrs. McKinley has ever given to a newspaper reporter, she being then in New Orleans on the trip which ended in her illness, Mrs. McKinley began to talk about the President, whose name was mentioned. "Do you know Major McKinley?" she asked. "Ah, no one can know him, because to appreciate him one must know him as I do. And I am not speaking now of Major McKinley as the President. I am speaking of him as my husband. If anyone could know what it is to have a sick wife, complaining, always, an invalid for 25 years, seldom a day well, and yet never a word of unkindness has ever passed his lips, he is just the same tender, thoughtful, kind gentleman I knew when first he came and sought my hand. I know him because I am his wife; and my proudest pleasure is to say this, not because he is the President, but because he is my husband. He is so kind, so good, so patient. He gives me all the time he can; he never forgets me, no matter how busy he is. But I will be glad when he is out of public life. I did not want him to run a second time. I thought that he had done enough for the country, and now I know that he has done enough, and when his term expires he will come home and we will settle down quietly and he will belong to me."—Pittsburg Dispatch.
