A CORRESPONDENT in writing from Port Hill says: Many people throughout the province will regret to learn of the death of Mrs. Dougherty wife of Mr. David Dougherty of this place, which sad event occurred a few days ago after a short illness. Mrs. Dougherty was of an unassuming character and her early death is universally regretted.

Eggs are very low in Halifax, having slumped to 12c and 13c per dozen by the case. Even that may be too high; for one north end dealer on Friday was selling eggs at retail, two dozen for 25 cents. The cause of the fall is the importation of eggs from the west, added to supplies from Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia points.—Herald.

Major Weeks writing from Belmont on Jan. 27th, says that he wrote twice and had telegraphed to Cape Town but the boxes sent from Charlottetown had not arrived then. The Queen's Xmas box of chocolates had arrived and the empty boxes were being sold for two and a half dollars each as souvenirs. It was not safe to send them by mail as they would be stolen. The letter was received in the city last night.

TUESDAY market was well attended considering the unfavorable condition of the roads. Some thirty five loads of hay were disposed of and the general hay market is firm with a liberal supply, 39 to 41 cents was paid. The hog market is holding its own and 5 3-4 was the ruling price. Many of the carcasses were above the average and all were of excellent quality. There is reported to be quite a lot of oats moving. The market in the city, however, remains steady and white oats exchanged hands at 30 cents and black at 31 cents. A small quantity of potatoes were offered and 18 and 18 1-2 were paid. The half cent was paid for extra good stock. Owing to the weather a fairly large quantity of beef was offered, the best of which sold for 5 and 5 1-2 cents per pound. In the market building the attendance was large. The egg supply is increasing and the price is reduced. The demand for fresh butter is still equal to the supply and 22 cents was paid.
