Canada The Leader In Duty Collection LONDON, Eng., May 5.—In answer to a query put to the Government at question time in the House of Commons today, as to the amount of import duties on British goods in Australia, Canada South Africa, India and New Zealand in the last financial year, and the amount of import duties imposed in the United Kingdom on goods from the Dominions, Lieut. Col. Albert Buckley, secretary of the department of overseas trade, stated that South Africa, £270,000; Canada, £270,000; Australia, £270,000; New Zealand, £2,000; girl. The duties collected in New Zealand on goods imported in 1921, at the rates of the present tariff, which came into force on November 4, 1921, amounted to about £3,500,000, Col. Buckley said. "The duties collected in South Africa on such goods in 1921 amounted, according to calculations based on the published figures of imports and rates of duty, Col. Buckley expressed regret that no corresponding figures were available in the cases of Australia and India. The amount of duty collected in the United Kingdom on goods admitted to preference consisted in the financial year 1922-23 follows: Australia, £270,000; Canada, £270,000; New Zealand, £2,000; girl. Govt. Slowness On Immigration Aired by Beatty Meeting Of Maritime Stock Breeders

MONTREAL, May 6.—The annual general meeting of shareholders of the Canadian Pacific Railway held here today was one of the best attended within recent years and in his address the president, E. W. Beatty, K. C., presented a condition of affairs which he declared as gratifying, while his outlook for the future was decidedly optimistic. Results for 1922 had been satisfactory with the recent business improvement, having regard to the unusually severe winter and the imposition of the Crow's Nest Pass rates which had caused a loss to the company only made up by the abnormally heavy crop movements. The president said it was gratifying to note that there was promise of a good influx of settlers of the type Canada particularly needs while he hoped for still better things as a result of the recent agreement between the Imperial and Canadian Governments for British settlers. He hoped also for a considerable influx from certain over populated European countries and a steady flow of desirable colonists from the United States. He contrasted the slowness of the Canadian Government in grappling with the immigration problem as compared with the energetic and forward policies of other portions of the Empire. Mr. Beatty referred to the recent developments on the Canadian National Railways which he said would test the wisdom of the policies adopted by former Governments and reveal whether these railways could be successfully administered without further exhausting demands on the national exchequer. He issued a sharp warning against political interference in the management of the Canadian National which could only increase the onerous burdens of the country.
