Swine Breeders Annual Meeting

With the average quality of the exhibits much higher, and with prices for the choicest animals reaching new high records the Fourth Annual Swine Show and Sale held yesterday in the Agricultural Hall eclipsed all similar events of preceding years. About twenty-five sows and thirteen boars were judged by Mr. Alex. Dynnes of Ottawa who made special reference to the improved quality of the exhibits. Mr. Frank McAulay of Souris won first in the male class with a boar out of his grand champion sow and sired by Dixon Dan. Mr. Ashford Andrews, Milton, came second with Walter Buntan, Rustico, third. In the female class Mr. McAulay again won with a full sister to his first prize sow. Mr. Alex Hamilton, New Perth, was second with Geo. Boswell, Frenchfort, third.

In the afternoon the exhibits were offered to the public by Mr. J. A. McDonald, auctioneer. A large number of prospective purchasers were present and the bidding was brisk. The first prize boar went to the Gloucester Lumber Co., Bathurst N. B., for the record sum of \$100. The first prize sow was purchased by St. Dunstan's University for fifty five dollars. Many of the choicest animals went to parties in N. B., and N. S. The demand for boars and brood sows exceeded the supply. There was evidence of a shortage of top males, and several good orders from outside the province could not be filled. The successful conclusion to this event should stimulate Island breeders to greater efforts in placing before the public Yorkshires of still higher merit at future sales.

MURDOCH McLEOD—NONAGENARIAN

The death took place at his home Bellevue, Caledonia, in his 92nd year of Mr. Murdoch R. McLeod retired farmer on Oct. 1st, 1930.

Born at Grand View, P. E. I., July 1839, he took up land at Bellevue a few miles distant. Here he raised his family lived and passed on, as Job says "Like as a shock of corn cometh in in his season".

From conviction like his forebears, and from his own choice, he was a life long member of the Presbyterian church. From this position nothing or no one could swerve or dissuade him. After June 1925 he joined the Presbyterian congregation of Caledonia. He was loved and revered by all who knew him. The largely attended funeral services at the home and grave were conducted by minister Rev. Alliston Murray, Caledonia, assisted by Rev. D. M. Sinclair, Valleyfield. The interment was in Valleyfield Cemetery. The pallbearers were Bruce McLeod, Whitfield McLeod, Angus R. McLeod, Donald Alex McPherson, Jno Angus McDonald Joseph Simons and David McDonald. No family friends or community could but mourn and miss such a noble type of father and christian. Our sympathies go out to them. We cannot do better than offer them the words of Eph 5.1 Be ye therefore followers of God as dear children.

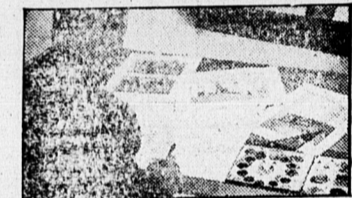

THE PULLET RATION

A definite plan of feeding is necessary to insure best results from laying pullets, poultry experts of the Dominion Department of Agriculture advise. The well balanced ration includes scratch grain, mash, green feed, grit, shell, certain supplementary vitamins

feeds, plenty of fresh clean water. There are, however, a wide variety of materials which go to make up this ration. Home mixing of suitable for

mula is recommended. Wheat, oats and corn or barley go into making of a good mash. Fifteen per cent of animal feeds, one per cent of salt and on equal quality of cod liver oil should be mixed in. Grit and oyster shell should be available in hoppers at all times. Alfalfa, clover or cabbage make excellent green feed and where these are not available alfalfa leaf meal may be used. Raw potatoes, field carrots and mangels make excellent supplementary feeds. The feeding of cod liver oil supplies the vitamins which prevents rickets.

CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS EARNINGS

The gross earnings of the Canadian National Railways for the week ending October 7th, 1930, were \$4,427,822 as compared with \$5,321,521 for the corresponding period in 1929, a decrease of \$893,644.
