LITTLE GIRL DROWNED.—The following is taken from a recent number of The Jordan Gazette, of Jordan, Dawson County, Montana. The parents of the deceased child are both natives of this province, the father, Mr. Jos. Howe, being a son of Mr. Angus J. McDonald, Hermitage, and the mother the second eldest daughter of the late Archibald McPhee of Selkirk. To the bereaved The Guardian joins in tendering sympathy.—A cloud of sorrow was cast over this little city a week ago last Sunday evening, when the information was brought to town that Irene Johanna, aged 7 years daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. McDonald of Smokey Butte, had been drowned in the Big Dry Creek. The Gazette has not learned the details of the sad affair, but it seems that some of the children of the neighborhood were swimming or wading in the creek and the little girl was taken in too far from the water's edge by one of the larger children and in the absence of the assistance of a grown person, she was unable to reach the shore and the children who were present could not rescue her. Irene Johanna McDonald was born at Smokey Butte on August 10, 1910, and was therefore 6 years and 11 months of age. She was a bright and jovial little girl and was a general favorite among her childish associates. The home will be lonely without her presence. The remains were taken into Miles City, where funeral services were held on Tuesday, July 24th and burial was made in the Catholic cemetery in that city. Father J. J. 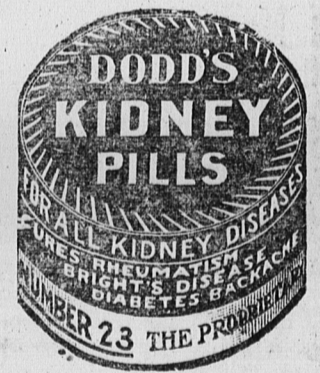
### HOW ARE STARS COUNTED?

Stars are counted by means of the telescope and photography. The Astronomer Royal for Ireland, Sir Robert S. Ball, in one of his lectures mentioned a photograph which had been obtained by Isaac Roberts representing a small part of the constellation of the Swan. The picture is about as large as the page of a copy book, and it is so crowded with stars that it would puzzle most people to count them; but they have been counted by a patient person, and the number is about 16,000. Many of these stars are too faint ever to be seen in the greatest of telescopes yet erected.—Book of Wonders.

### MACHINE SHOP FOR FIELD

The Electrical World describes a portable machine shop similar in every respect to the ones now in use on the continental battlefields and recently completed for the United States army. The shop is mounted on a motor truck which carries a complete electric generating outfit for operating the motors driving the machine tools and also to supply electricity to the lamps. A separate gasoline engine is used to drive a direct-current dynamo, which is specially constructed to withstand rough usage. There is a lathe, drill press, and bench grind-

er, in addition to a forge and little arbor presses, work bench, vices, and a complete assortment of machinist's and blacksmith's tools. Over 250 items are included in the equipment, among the interesting features of which are an electric vulcanizing apparatus and a complete truck chassis of standard three-ton heavy-duty design. It has a British army type of driver's seat, suitable for four men, and is equipped with a varied assortment of motor accessories.
