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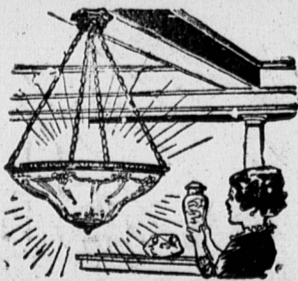

# REV. CANON TROOP IN ST. PAUL'S YESTERDAY

Synopsis of His Sermon on "The Greatest Problem in the World and How to Deal With It?"

Rev. Canon Troop, M. A. of Hall throne and the beggar on the street, high and low, rich and poor, all slaves! What a magnificent thing then, that there is a Way Out!  
Paul knew what slavery meant. He was himself a Roman citizen and as proud of it as we are of our citizenship in the Great British Empire. But he was also born into the slavery of sin and death. He was freed from the law and by the condition of his freedom became the bondsman of Jesus Christ, purchasing with service the only true freedom.

The late Bishop Lightwood of Durham preaching from the text: "Ye were bought with a price," said: "If you would measure the awfulness of sin, measure it by the degree of sacrifice that alone could put it away." If, the Prince of Wales should die for one of the humblest workmen of England, how the whole world would ring with the news! Not because it was an unheard of thing for a man to give his life for another, but because it was the glorious Prince, the darling of the Empire, who did it. But who is the Prince of Wales, noble and beloved as he is, beside the Prince of Heaven, the only Son of the one living God? Himself, for us and for our salvation, came down from Heaven, took our nature without its sin lived and suffered unto death, that by so doing He might put away sin and set its captive free.

Christ's physical sufferings on the Cross were the least of His agonies, which were mental and spiritual—a tragedy incomprehensible to us in its intensity. Upon Him God laid the iniquities of us all, and by His death He washed out the sins of the world. If He had not died, His glorious teaching and His splendid example would have left us but the more in despair. No soul could have been saved by His wonderful sermon on the Mount. It was His death on the Calvary that opened the kingdom of Heaven to all believers.  
In conclusion the speaker again quoted Bishop Lightwood in his farewell sermon at Durham: "Remember, you are bought with a price. Remember, you are not your own. Remember, he slaves now that you may be free forever more."

Only a few weeks ago the provincial United Farmers' convention was held at Fredericton, with an attendance of less than 150 out of an expected 500, while last week, in the same city, a Conservative convention for the county only was held AT WHICH THERE WERE OVER EIGHT HUNDRED DELEGATES "PRESENT." It was not only the largest and strongest convention ever held in that city, and so admitted by the Liberal press, but it was also the most harmonious and enthusiastic in the history of the county. At this convention Mr. R. B. Hanson, K. C., was unanimously nominated to contest the vacancy created by the death of the late Colonel McLeod, based upon his own ignorance, but UPON HIS PRESUMPTION OF THE PEOPLE'S STUPIDITY.

Last year when the Liberal government of New Brunswick went to the people, the Grain Growers party were in the zenith of their political strength and almost succeeded in defeating the Foster administration; in fact it is now a minority government as against all parties. But the tide of political prestige has, since then, receded most rapidly, the best element of eastern farmers having pronounced against interference in politics as a body, while there is on the other hand that strongest

Adding this circumstance to the enormous majority of over four thousand votes polled by the Hon. Mr. Wignmore in St. John County only a short time ago, and the big majority of over fifteen hundred in favor of Hon. F. B. McCurdy in Colchester, a nearby county in N. S., it is surely looking as if Premier Weighen is going to make a clean sweep of the Maritime provinces at the general election. There was certainly nothing in these cited instances to give MacKenzie King any inspiration for his "NO MANDATE" walls, and surely nothing upon which his Maritime supporters can justify their voting for his re-election. These same conditions prevail in this province; the people slenkened partly by the perfidies of the Bell government, and partly by the ever changing tactics of the unstable MacKenzie King, have lost all confidence in anything they find behind the cloak of so-called Liberalism, and are only waiting for the chance to give them the medicine they so much need, and so richly deserve.

A convenient and sometimes popular method of enjoying the profits of sin, without carrying the whole load of odium, is by making a monkey of the other fellow to do the dirty work. Something akin to this is in the air in relation to the patronage question between the Liberal and Grain Growers' parties. At the sound of the word patronage the agrarians have ever held up their hands in holy horror and at their public conferences have denounced it as amongst the great national evils. But since coming into the government of Ontario they have developed a strong taste for this morsel of evil, and how to satisfy the appetite without outward appearance of sin has become the problem, but at last apparently solved. A union with the Liberal party is in prospect, or rather a gobbling up of the Liberals by the agrarians. Now the Liberals always revelling in the plunder of the province.

**DEMAND UPON PRESIDENT WILSON.**—After a heated debate, the House, adopted a resolution calling upon President Wilson for an itemized statement showing disbursements and allotments of the \$150,000,000 war funds voted by Congress.

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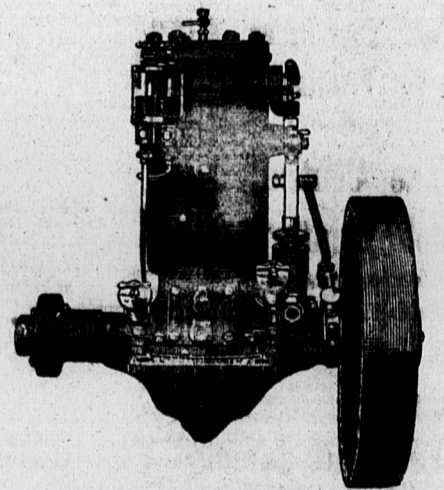
