**Late Market News**

**MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 12.**—Potatoes and butter prices were lower while cheese was unchanged on the produce and dairy market here today. New Brunswick green mountain potatoes to retailers graded five cents an 85 pound bag, being quoted at 80 to 85 cents, while in carlots they were unchanged at 75 cents per 90 pounds bulk. Carlot prices of eggs were lower, fresh extras being unchanged at 20 cents a dozen, while fresh firsts and fresh pullet extras were also unchanged at 25 cents and fresh seconds lost one cent at 20 to 21 cents a dozen. Storage firsts and seconds both lost one half of a cent at 17 and 15 cents a dozen respectively. Quotations to retailers were unchanged. Receipts were 603 cases. On the butter market price for carlots was quoted at 32 to 32 1/4 cents a pound, which was one half of a cent lower. As the majority of stock was eastern townships no. 1 pasteurized grass make regraded creamery with some western butter broken lots were up to 32 1/2 cents a pound to retailers, solids were 34 cents and prints 35 cents a pound. Receipts were 884 boxes. Winter white cheese was 12 cents a pound and winter colored 14 1/2 to 14 3/4 cents, while summer cheese was 15 1/2 to 16 cents a pound. Receipts were only 5 boxes.

**OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 12.**—Eggs. A firming continues to develop on Canadian egg markets with supplies decreasing steadily. Storage egg holdings on the 1st of February were 3,136,434 dozen as compared to 221,345 dozen a year ago, according to the preliminary report of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

**TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 12.**—Egg supplies here are light and the market firm. Sales of graded eggs are being made to wholesale dealers to 23 24, seconds 18-20, delivered. Wholesale prices of fresh eggs to retailers are extras 32, firsts 29, pullet extras 25, seconds 22.

**MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 12.**—Egg receipts here today were 603 cases as compared to 862 cases for the corresponding day last year. The fresh market is unchanged, but storage eggs are in good demand with receipts lighter this week.

**HALIFAX, N. S., Feb. 12.**—Receipts of local fresh eggs continue light and prices are advancing with supplies insufficient to meet trade requirements. Storage stocks also are showing some activity, dealers are quoting producers and country shippers for eggs extras 24-26, firsts 20-22, seconds 16-17, delivered. Wholesale prices of fresh eggs to retailers are extras 35-36, firsts 30-32, seconds 25-26.

**SAINT JOHN, N. B., Feb. 12.**—Fresh eggs of all grades are now scarce on this market and wholesale prices have advanced one to two cents. Storage eggs are moving better and there is some enquiry from outside points. Wholesale prices of fresh eggs to retailers are extras 30-32, firsts 28-30, seconds 22-24. Storage eggs are wholesaling at extras 20, firsts 18-20, seconds 17.

samples to be followed.

All-candle electric chandeliers light the corridors and halls of the ground floor. The hall radiators, which are of the thermostatic control, are concealed in the walls. The lobby and kitchen floors are terrazzo while the other ground floors are oak and birch.

On each side of the main entrance on Kent Street are the hotel offices and directly across the wide corridor, extending to the rear of the hotel is the large dining room. The room is finished in an ancient setting, and is painted pale green with the ceiling of ivory. The novel columns combine several types. The lounge room in the western section is done in Old English Mode. The oak panelings feature the Coats of Arms of the nine provinces of Canada. The wood work is antiquated in keeping with the rest of the room. The walls are painted dull grey. The walls of the writing room are grained to represent oak paneling, with the upper portion in ivory. The breakfast room is finished in warm buff, with the panel moulds shaded in green.

The commodious kitchen, located in the rear to the right, is fitted with the latest appliances, steam warming tables, electric dishwashers, steam pressure vegetable cooker, potato peeler. The butcher shop is complete with meat slicers, and refrigerators. The grill room is furnished with coffee urns, automatic toaster, egg boiler.

Each of the five bedrooms, and the rooms of the special suite of the fourth floor have private bathrooms finished in white tile. All corridors, floors and bedroom floors will be carpeted.

Two 125 horse power boilers in the basement, equipped with automatic

stokers heat the building. The hotel has a modern ventilation system. The fresh air is brought into the basement, and supplied to the rooms by seven large electric fans. Seven other fans in the pent house on the roof draw the foul air from the rooms and liberate it.

The laundry is also located in the basement. Two large washers, a flat work ironer, two steam clothes pressers, and other equipment of the most modern type guarantee satisfactory service.

Artificial refrigeration is provided for the five store rooms for meat, poultry, fish and dairy products.

A humidor, a shoe shine parlor, and a barber shop complete a service which is the last word in convenience.

ario's people. The cooperation of the federal and provincial governments with the municipalities has contributed materially toward relieving the situation.

The fact that the Imperial Conference is to resume in Ottawa this year is viewed as a significant recognition of our position in the British world. Other legislation announced includes measures respecting the Department of Public Welfare, confirmation of municipal expenditures for unemployment relief, establishment of health units, improvement of agricultural marketing conditions, inclusion of blind workers under the Workmen's Compensation Act, amendments to the law concerning trades disputes, revision and consolidation of existing hospital laws, unifying of legislation respecting assignment of book debts, special surveys of crop conditions and marketing opportunities, improvement of herds in regard to milk production and more effective means of protecting live stock against ravages of parasites, are promised as measures to assist agriculture. Establishment of a training school for girls, similar to that now in existence for boys at Bowmanville under the Department of Public Welfare, is promised, as are also efforts to segregate first offenders from habitual criminals in jails and other penal institutions.

The speech expresses satisfaction at the renewal of Federal grants for technical and vocational education as tending to give a new impetus to this work. It also announces that the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway, will reach tidal waters this year, a notable milestone in Ontario's progress.

The speech expresses pleasure at the appointment of Lord Bessborough as Gov. General and of Hon. G. H. Ferguson as Canadian High Commissioner to England and regret at the death of Princess Royal, sister of the King.

**Wireless Within 18 Months For Arabian Desert**

**BAGDAD, Feb. 12.**—Wireless for the Arabian desert within 18 months is the object aimed at by Ibn Saud, King of Hedjas and Nejd, who has signed a contract with the Marconi Company for the supply of 15 wireless stations, which will provide Arabia with a complete system of telegraph communication. In addition, four Marconi sets fitted in lorries are to be supplied as mobile telegraph stations and to enable the King to keep in constant touch with his two Capitals, Mecca and Riyadh, during his journeys into the desert.

A powerful telephone and telegraph transmitter with a modern type receiver will be installed in Mecca, and as persons who are not of the Mohammedan faith are forbidden to enter the Holy City, a Mohammedan engineer will install the equipment. A British engineer will supervise the installation of the Arabian stations outside Mecca. To provide for maintenance, King Ibn Saud has sent four of his subjects to England for a course of instruction in the Marconi School.

Malcolm Campbell when he returns to England after breaking two world automobile speed records at Daytona Beach, Florida, the House of Commons was informed today. In some circles it is considered possible that Capt Campbell will be made a knight as was Sir Henry St. John on his return from Daytona after setting the record that Campbell broke.

**DEVILLED KIDNEYS**

Cut up fresh, beef kidneys into small pieces, rejecting all the fat. Soak overnight in salt and water. In the morning rinse well and pour boiling water over them. This is to take away the strong taste. In to a frying pan put one tablespoon butter, and when melted add one or two finely minced onions, and fry a delicate brown. Add the kidneys, which have been drained, dredge well with flour, season with salt and pepper, and cover with lukewarm water — in fact, cool water. Cook until kidneys are tender, and gravy is rich brown. Add a little more liquid if necessary. Serve with baked potatoes and melted toast.

**Welfare Legislation Prepared For Session**

**ONTARIO ASSEMBLY TO DEAL EXTENSIVELY WITH HOSPITALS AND PRISONS; MINOR AMENDMENTS EXPECTED IN LIQUOR CONTROL AND OTHER ACTS; NEW FACES IN THE CABINET AND AMONG THE PRIVATE MEMBERS**

**TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 12.**—General revamping of the laws governing hospitals and penal institutions of the province and action on cancer research and radium, following the recommendations of the Ross Commission on Public Welfare, will be the basis for much of the legislation at the second session of the eighteenth Legislative Assembly of Ontario which opens on Feb. 12.

Minor amendments to the Liquor Control Act, Motor Vehicles Act, Municipalities Act, Security Frauds Prevention and Highways Acts may also be included on the government's legislative programme. Despite the deficit of \$628,000 shown in the pre-session report of the Provincial Treasurer, no change is anticipated at the forthcoming session in schedules and methods of taxation.

One new portfolio has been introduced to the executive council and considerable change has occurred in the personnel and grouping of departments, since the last session. Three ministers return with the portfolios they held in the last session. Hon. W. H. Price, Attorney-General; Hon. Charles McCrea, Minister of Mines and Hon. W. F. Finlayson, Minister of Lands and Forests. Newcomers in the Executive Council are: Hon. J. M. Robb, Minister of Health; Hon. Leopold Macaulay, Provincial Secretary; Hon. T. L. Kennedy, Minister of Agriculture and Hon. W. G. Martin, Minister of Public Welfare, the new portfolio created in accordance with the report of the Ross Commission. Hon. Paul Poisson and Hon. H. C. Schofield are Ministers without Portfolios.
