WAS THE COMPOSER OF "THE HOLY CITY"

Mr. Michael Maybrick, who under the name of "Stephen Adams" was perhaps the most popular song composer of recent years, died suddenly recently at Buxton, where he had been staying for the benefit of his health. He did not come down to breakfast, and on inquiry being made he was found dead in bed, the cause of death being supposed to be heart failure. His songs, including such favorites as "A Warrior Bold," "Nancy Lee," "The Midshipmite," "The Star of Bethlehem," and "The Holy City," have been heard by countless audiences, wherever the English language is spoken. He was the brother of Mr. James Maybrick, a Liverpool merchant, whose death from arsenic in 1889 led to the trial of his widow, Florence Elizabeth Maybrick, on a charge of murder. She was ultimately sentenced to death, but was reprieved and in 1911 she was released after serving over fourteen years imprisonment.

CLAY A FOOD OF SOME RACES.

The habit of eating earth or clay is one of the most unpleasant characteristics of the Southern "crackers," but the practice is not confined to any race or region of the world, says The Scientific American. In America, several tribes of Indians of the northern as well as the southern continent use earth as food.

The Pawnee Indians used to eat a yellowish clay, which they shaped into little balls that were dried in the open air, and then roasted over the fire. When the clay became red the balls were removed, moistened with water, and eaten. These clay balls were oftenest served with fish, and some of the Mackenzie River Indians resort to the earth as food in times of famine. They dug out the clay that they found in hollows along the banks of the river. In prosperous years they chewed the clay as a delicacy. The Apaches mixed powdered clay with their meals before baking their rude loaves of bread.

In South Africa, the Indians in the uplands of Bolivia eat a light clay that is nearly white in color. This they use either raw or in the form of cakes of various shapes, which are sold in the market places. They also prepare a sauce with the clay. This they eat with boiled potatoes.

Among the negroes of the Guinea Coast, as well as among those of West Africa, the eating of clay is very common. The natives of the Sudan dig their favorite clay from between layers of sandstone in the banks of rivers. The natives of Java prepare little cakes of clay containing ochre. These are sold in the public markets.

The "hairy Anius," the aborigines of northern Japan, mix clay with their rice, and with the leaves of various plants that they use food. In Persia, certain classes of the population think that some varieties of clay are delicious luxuries and in the foot hills of the Himalayas the natives are constantly chewing a piece of greenish clay, which they believe has the property of protecting them against goitre.

In Finland, as well as in parts of Sweden, powdered clay is mixed with the flour used for baking bread. In

FACTS ABOUT CANADA.

World's wheat eaters, 1871, 375 millions; now, 517 millions.

Bank, the gateway of the Canadian National Park is one of the most attractive spots in America.

Ontario's population increased by 340,261 between 1901 and 1911, and is now equal to 9.67 persons per square mile.

Total production of British Columbia mines up to 1912, \$397,696,722, including gold \$137,175,633; silver, \$32,058,895; lead, \$25,715,126; copper, \$65,315,049.

Winnipeg's annual freight tonnage exceeds two and a half million tons.

Nova Scotia's 1912 timber cut, 250 million feet.

The centre of wheat production in North America is now in the Canadian Northwest.

OIL FOR MOTOR POWER IN BRITISH WAR SHIPS.

The British torpedo-boat destroyer Hardy, recently commissioned at Portsmouth, is the first British war-ship to be fitted with an installation of internal combustion engines with oil as the basis of power. The Hardy has two sets of Parsons turbines for high-speed steam—ing—32 knots is the designed rate—but for cruising work each propeller shaft is driven by a Diesel motor, the speed available by this means being between 12 and 15 knots. Eight oil-carrying ships are under construction for the naval service, and six of these will be driven by oil engines exclusively.
