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was often sought after. Those who had come to know her best were heard giving expression to such sentiments as "To know her was to love her." "She was too good to remain longer in this cold and sinful world." She came to earth to show us how unselfish, how beautiful, and how Christ-like a life could be lived even in this world of selfishness of suffering and of trial.  
But while she will be much missed, knowing that she has passed from beyond all suffering and all pain and realizing that now she is infinitely more happy than she could be here upon the earth, although many faint would do so none would be so unkind as to wish "her unbound spirit" back into bond again."

The floral tributes from kind friends were very beautiful, especially was this true of the pillow of lilies and hyacinths decorated with white ribbon in which was written in letters of gold the name "Nettie".  
The pall bearers were six cousins of the deceased viz., Bremer Auld, Freetown; Dr. J. A. McMurdo, Summerside; Scott McArthur, North Bedouque; Alexander and Silas McParlane, Fernwood and Samuel Waugh, New Annan. Interment was in the Presbyterian Cemetery, North Bedouque.

## IN MEMORIAM

**MISS NETTIE E. STAVERT.**  
It was with deep regret and sorrow that it became known among our many friends that during the forenoon of Wednesday, April 26th, Miss Nettie E. Stavert youngest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Peter B. Stavert of Wilmot Valley had passed peacefully away in the Prince County Hospital at the early age of 28 years. A little over a year the deceased had completed her training course in a Moncton Hospital. Shortly before the time of her graduation her health began to fall and during the past year she had been resting. Less than three months ago she went to the Prince Co. Hospital to be treated for what was believed to be rheumatism. Her health was improving. She was becoming like her old self again, until in the early part of April she was stricken with meningitis and after three weeks suffering her spirit took its flight. The coming of death is always sad but when it comes to one so young and so clever and who, with such bright hopes before her, is just starting out upon her chosen career it seems doubly sad. Miss Stavert had met with splendid success in her training. With the hospital staff she was a genial favorite and especially so in the operating room. For some months before the closing of her course she was made assistant superintendent. She loved her work and many suffering ones will long remember her tender and sympathetic care. Often had she received tokens of affectionate remembrance from grateful patients. Because of her recognized ability and willingness to work it is feared that she was often allowed to do more than her share. Believing that her strength was equal to any emergency and because of her unselfishness in never refusing anything that was asked of her she went on until her health gave way.  
With all that kind, friends and medical aid could do it was hoped that her health would soon be restored. This goal seemed not far away when like a bolt from the blue sky, she in her more or less weakened condition of health was attacked by one of the incurable diseases and after not many days all was over. Though all the time of her illness she was ever bright and cheerful and with strong Christian fortitude was ready for whatever the future had in store for her. Should it be that the call to go the way of all the earth would come. She asked her loved ones not to mourn for her and she assured them, that come what would all would be well.
