Ch' Town Delegates to International Convention

At a meeting of the cabinet of the Students Christian Movement, held Monday night, Miss Margaret McNeill and Mr. Alexander Stewart were elected by ballot, delegates to the Ninth International Convention of the Student Volunteer movement to be held in Indianapolis, Ind., beginning on December 28th. Each University and College in Canada and the United States will be represented by two or more delegates and it is expected there will be between seven and ten thousand delegates present. The attendance at the last convention, held in Des Moines in 1920 numbered 6,850. The delegates from Charlottetown will be joined at Sackville by the Dalhousie, Acadia and Mount Allison Universities, at St. John by U. N. B. delegates and thereafter by the various United States contingents.

Dominion Historic Records From Britain

LONDON, Nov. 27.—Dr. A. G. Doughty, Dominion Archivist, sails tomorrow for Canada after a most successful raid on the private treasures in England and France, for documents of historical importance for the Dominion. German Reparation Problem

(Continued from Page One.)

The opinion is gaining ground in the commission that the whole reparation question is becoming so tangled that the allies will be compelled to agree on some common policy or break on the question as soon as the British interior political situation has cleared.

It is learned that the Franco-Belgians base their claim to payment of their occupation expenses out of the proceeds of the deliveries which give priority to occupation costs over reparation. Under these articles they contend that the reparation committee, on receipt of proceeds from such deliveries, must deduct therefrom an amount sufficient to pay for the occupation and divide the sum among the occupying powers on the basis of the yearly lump sums agreed upon in March of last year.

The Monk to come to the Youssouppoff palace on the Litoyn Prospect in Petrograd where a band of nobles poisoned and shot him. The Prince admitted on his arrival to reporters that he was one of this band. He declined to say who fired the fatal shot.

The Prince brought with him a large leather covered box, containing the famous black pearl necklace of the Youssouppoff family, jewels of Catharine the Great, and a number of valuable antique snuff boxes, miniatures and odds and ends. He told reporters he intended to put them up for exhibition and sale.
