In Memoriam

REV. D. J. MORRISON
At the Manse at Bradabane, January 30, 1946, there passed peacefully on to his eternal rest Rev. D. J. Morrison, pastor of the Bradabane United Church. After a short service at the Manse at twelve o'clock February 2nd, the remains were conveyed to the United Church nearby, where the funeral service was conducted at two o'clock. Rev. George Goff had charge of the service.
Rev. A. D. MacKenzie, D. D., preached the sermon from the text chosen by the deceased, "I go to my father." Rev. W. I. Green then gave a very fine tribute to the late pastor. Other clergy assisting were Rev. H. L. Wagner, Bedouque; Rev. J. I. Morrison, Hunter River and Rev. N. A. Murray, Kensington, who sang, "Does Jesus Care?"
Services at the grave were conducted by Rev. W. I. Green. Then the L. O. L. committal service was conducted by Brother S. French, F. G. M., Charlottetown.
The funeral was very largely attended by people who came from far and near to pay respect to one so well loved and loved so much. The pall bearers were Messrs. James Graham, Thos. Wigmore, Alex. MacDonald, Harvey Bernard, Benjamin Taylor and Frank Culliffe. Interment was at Bradabane Cemetery.

With Canada's Naturalists

TORONTO, Perturbed by the number of Woodstock, Ont., youngsters who were getting into scrapes over robbing birds' nests, a Woodstock magistrate 17 years ago called on E. Dutton, local naturalist, and bird-lover, to talk to the offenders.
As a result of these talks Mr. Dutton organized a nature club for the boys, took them on hikes and taught them the names of the birds. To date more than 3,000 boys from eight to 14 have enjoyed the instruction and companionship of this voluntary local naturalist who daily life is a master reader.
There are no more "collections" of eggs stolen from the nests of wild birds, in Woodstock; the present membership of 164 boys find it most enjoyable to study the birds as they appear in their season.
Periodically, snakes shed their skin in one piece. Beginning at the lips, the skin peels off backwards and inside out. Snakes have to deliberate effort to accomplish the shedding. First, they rub the snout on the ground or on some rough surface. Then they begin to peel the skin from the margin of the lips. It is then drawn off gradually in the end length by the mouth. Progress over the ground, assisted by the wave-like action of the muscles beneath the skin.
Before the skin-shedding process begins, snakes develop a filmy whiteness over the eyes, and for a few days they are practically blind. They spend this period in hiding and without food. A day or two before the shed is complete the eyes become clear and normal again.
Gazing in wide-eyed wonder at a frog on the grass before him one day, a professional naturalist began to doubt his sobriety for the frog was all "hit up." It was definitely a toad.

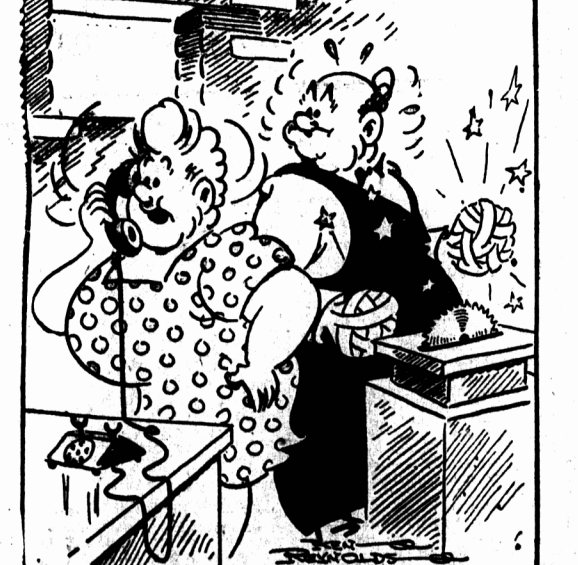
