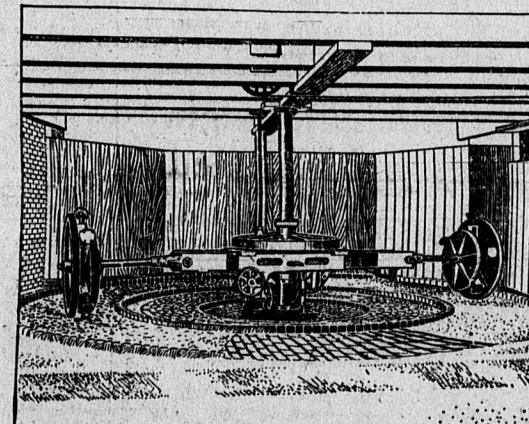

The "Paving Determinator's" Verdict.

It imitates heavy trucks and steel-shod draught horses, reproducing, in faithful detail, every effect of this kind of traffic. This remarkable machine was recently used to test five varieties of street pavement—covering practically the entire range of present-day road coverings. A report of the test says:

"When the test had been made under the direction of Mr. McCabe and officials of the department, on eight sections of pavement laid in a circular track, the concrete section, laid under the specifications of the Board of County Road Commissioners of Wayne County, Michigan, showed by far the best resistance to the severe test to which the pavements were put."
