Race Further Postponed Until Wednesday; Thebaud Undergoes Small Repairs

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Oct. 17—A title was at stake tonight, the sailing championship of the North Atlantic, but absence of a breeze again forced postponement of the third race of the International Fishermen's Trophy from tomorrow until Wednesday.
The Canadian defender, Captain Angus Walter's big salt water banker Bluenose, and Captain Ben Pine's challenger, the Gertrude L. Thebaud, each took one race of a three-out-of-five series for the coveted trophy put up for competition by Senator W. H. Dennis, publisher of The Halifax Herald. Light airs and fogs have baddered the series from the start.

While the Thebaud was out of water, her mainsail was carted off to be recut again. Thebaud cannot return to the water until about 6 a. m. on the morning tide, and it will be later than that before the mainsail can be bent on.
A meeting of the race committee will be held tomorrow morning at Boston to decide if the port or off Gloucester, and whether it will be held over the so-called short course, twice around an 18-mile triangle, or the long course, the old Gloucester international route which carried the vessels over 49 miles, a 30-mile triangle with a five-mile "tail," the tail to be sailed twice, at the start and finish.
Because expense money for the prolonged series has fallen far short, both skippers were faced with the probability some members of their crews would have to go back to the more remunerative business of fishing.
In previous races, a \$5,000 purse was at stake, \$3,000 for the winner and \$2,500 for the loser, but this year the purse stood to win little more than what their respective cooks use to decorate the tables in the forecastles.
