Record Attendance Looms For World Series Games; Teams Primed For Opener

Associated Press Sports Writer—NEW YORK, Sept. 28—(AP)—The calmest spots in a baseball-mad New York today were the Polo Grounds and the Yankee stadium where the Giants and Yankees worked out on their home diamonds for the last time before they meet in the first game of the world series Wednesday.

The two clubs will practice on rival fields tomorrow, with the Yankees getting their sights adjusted to the opening-game scenery at the Polo Grounds while the Giants take a workout in the Bronx Stadium.

These drills will complete preparations for a series that not only has the big town agog, after a 13-year interval in this rivalry, but which promises to shatter box-office records for baseball's championship affair.

ANNOUNCE SELLOUT

The Yankees followed the Giants today in announcing a sellout of all reserved seats. This means more than half the capacity of each park already has been sold at the rate of \$5.50 or \$6.00 per ticket, for six games.

On the day of each game, 24,000 unreserved seats will be on sale at Polo Grounds, or 30,000 at the Yankee Stadium. The unreserved sections consist of grandstand space at \$3.30 or bleachers at \$1.10 each.

There were two new developments and countless rumors in the two camps today.

Bill Terry changed his batting order, moving Mel Ott, National League home run champion, into the cleanup position in place of centre-fielder Jimmy Ripple.

Ripple, brought up from Montreal Royals at the beginning of the season was moved to fifth and will probably yield to Hank Leiber if the Yankees use a left-hander.

GOMEZ LIKELY CHOICE

Manager Joe McCarthy promised to announce his starting pitcher tomorrow. Judging from today's workout, Vernon "Lefty" Gomez will get the call.

Charlie Ruffing, who has been mentioned with Gomez as the possible Yankee starter, spent the entire practice session in the batting cage.

Monte Pearson, Yankee pitcher who injured his back last Thursday, spent most of this morning under the lights and then worked out for the first time since the injury. He reported to McCarthy that he could not throw at full speed. The Yankee manager said he doubted that Pearson would pitch before Sunday, if then.

Terry said Carl Hubbell definitely would pitch the opener. The wouthpaw ace hopes for warm

weather.

"I've had most of my bad days in cold weather this year," he said. Hubbell spent most of the practice period shagging files and talking to reporters. With "Hub" on the mound, the Giants were favored 3-5 to take the opener, but the Yanks were favored at 11-20 to take the series.

The big town had the baseball fever. Hotels, night clubs, and theatres all reported a rushing business.

Meanwhile, both ball clubs took steps to guard against a rush at the park gates Wednesday. More than 600 special policemen will be assigned to the Polo grounds. The park was even searched today for stowaways.

Unreserved grandstand and bleacher tickets do not go on sale until Wednesday morning, but the line of prospective buyers was growing tonight. First to arrive was "Tony" Albano of Brooklyn, who announced he had been at the ticket booth since Sept. 18.

Ticket Scalpers In The Money

NEW YORK, Sept. 28—(AP)—World series ticket scalpers were making the law of supply and demand pay high dividends today.

They were asking \$20 for a \$5.50 ticket, demanding that three be bought at a time, and still not filling the demand.

Even Ed Barrow's private supply of 6,000 tickets was dwindling. "I'd better put one aside for myself pretty soon or I won't be able to get in," said the Yankees' general manager.

Leaves For Atlantic City

Lloyd Matheson, local born hockey player, leaves this morning for Atlantic City where he will seek a berth this season on the famed Sea Gulls of the Eastern amateur league. Lloyd played last season with the Denver Canadians in Denver City. Watson MacEwen, erstwhile Abegweit net-minder who also played last year in Denver left Monday for Boston.

Other hockeyists who will shortly be trekking to other fields are Harry Currie who will rejoin the Hershey Bears accompanied probably by "Tick" Williams. Johnny Squarebriggs and Clarence Steele may once more don Baltimore Oriole colors.

Baseball Tilt Postponed Until Today

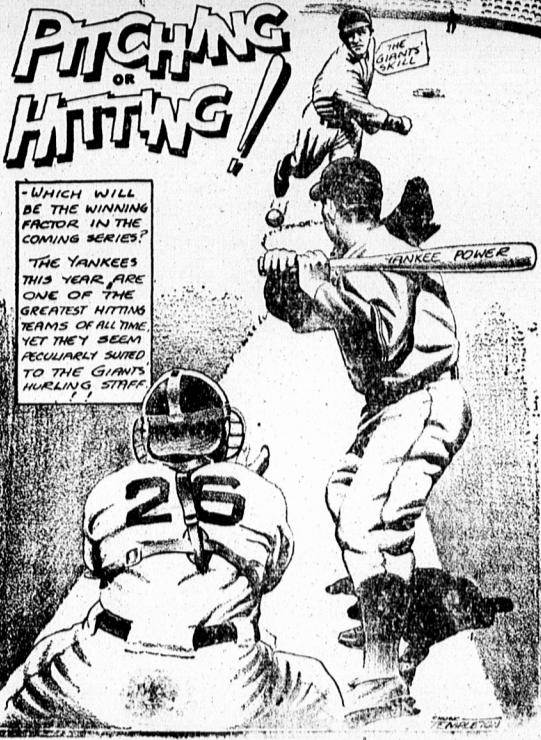

Giants Shade Yankees In The Outfield

NEW YORK, Sept. 28—(AP)—From every angle except speed and perhaps color, for whatever that elusive element is worth at the world series payoff window, New York Giants excel their Yankee neighbors in outfield equipment for the forth-coming frolic on opposite banks of the Harlem river.

The National Leaguers have the best all-round outfield in baseball at the current writing, regardless of whether Hank Leiber or Jim Ripple roams the middle garden between Jo Jo Moore and Mel Ott.

This takes into consideration the three essential factors of hitting, fly-catching and throwing. It holds true in spite of the slump of Leiber, who dropped from a 300 slugger in 1935 to a part time worker this season with a hitting mark of only .280 and consequently yielded to the freshman development of Jim Ripple, product of the International League.

The Yankees have a youthful and relatively inexperienced trio roaming the pastures. The combination of Jake Powell and George Selkirk, flanking the sensational Joe DiMaggio, boasts an aggregate major league background of only a half dozen years.

Dimaggio is the big question mark. The 21-year old kid from Frisco had had a wonderful first year under the big top. His bat, his grand throwing arm, his confidence and poise, had much to do with instilling the old winning spirit in the Yankees.

The giant freshman Ripple, not only filled a yawning gap in the batting order but proved himself a real ballhawk. He probably will see considerable series action inasmuch as most of the Yankee pitching staff is right handed. Leiber, a star-board swinger likely will get the call if and when Lefty Gomez pitches for the Yankees.

The Giant attack pivots around Ott and his big bat. The one time boy wonder, now in his eleventh season at the ripe old age of 27 was the batting hero of 1933 in which the Giants beat the Washington Senators. He has had one of his best years. He plays the right field caroms at the Polo Grounds like a Willie Hoppe and has a marvellously accurate throwing arm. Selkirk, the Yankee right fielder packs a solid punch and is fleet of foot than Ott but not otherwise in the same class with the Giant rival.

In left field Jo Jo Moore has an equally decisive margin over Powell except in aggressiveness and speed. Moore, in the leadoff role, is one of the most consistent first-ball hitters in the majors.

Ross Offered Title Bout In November

NEW YORK, Sept. 28—(AP)—Promoter James J. Johnston of Madison Square Garden today wired Sam Pian, one of the managers of Barney Ross, world's welter-weight champion, offering Ross a bout with the winner of next Friday night's fight between Jimmy McLarnin and Tony Canzoneri.

Since Ross has cancelled his trip to Australia to meet Jack Carroll, Johnston said he hoped to make the match for late November. McLarnin, Vancouver veteran, and Ross, young Chicago Hebrew, have met three times with Ross winning two decisions and "Jolting Jimmy" one. All the bouts were hard-fought and so close the decisions always raised controversy.

Lamb Leads Field For Pro Championship

Canadian Press Staff, Writer—CATARAQUI GOLF CLUB, KINGSTON, ONT., Sept. 28—(CP)—Willie Lamb of Toronto's Lamb-ton club, defending the Canadian professional golfers' championship won at Montreal last year, reached the half-way mark in the 72-hole medal play tourney with a five-stroke lead over his fellow Canadians today.

Tricky greens and rain-soaked turf boosted the scores and Lamb was four strokes over par. His par of 72's, for an aggregate of 114, was plenty good enough however to bring him out on top. Tomorrow the field, reduced by two withdrawals to 36 competitors, will play the final 36 holes.

Five shots behind Lamb were Bob Gray of Windsor, Ont., Art Hubert, of Toronto Thornhill and Bobby Burns of Montreal Hampstead, all tied.

Ab Jenkins Sets Eight New Auto Records

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, UTAH, Sept. 28—(AP)—Ab Jenkins set eight new motor car speed and endurance records today—and then was forced by mechanical trouble to end a run he's expected to bring a dozen more.

"That's all until next year," drawled the bronzed Utahian. Jenkins, who captured most of the world's major marks in a 28-hour grind last week, sent his \$40,000 racer away at 10:10:37 a.m. AST seeking the records he missed last week.

The unexpected end of the projected 13-hour run came 51 miles after Jenkins smashed the 1,000-mile record of England's John Cobb, 156.85 miles per hour, with 165.73 M.P.H.

Mechanics swarmed around the car as Jenkins eased off the course and into his pit tent. Examination disclosed the water pump impeller had cut out. All the water leaked out.

They fussed over the racer half an hour before Jenkins, driving without relief, decided to call it a day—and a year.

SUMMIT, N. J., Sept. 28—Following in the footsteps of her celebrated fellow-townsmen, Tony Manero, who sprang a surprise by capturing the 1936 Open Title, Mrs. Estelle Lawson Page of Greensboro, N.
