what has been spent of Army funds—which on the average is about \$48.50—so that similar work may be continued for others. This system engenders a spirit of independence; it tends to maintain self-respect; it creates a thought for others and helps the Army continue the good work.

The scheme limits the period over which repayments can be spread to a maximum of two years. In the matter of safeguards for the boys the commissioner says the boys' distributing centres are set up in country districts—not in large cities—and the officers keep in touch with the boys by visits and correspondence. During the first six months newspapers or magazines are posted regularly every week to the boy and if a boy wants to run away he knows where he can be assured of a sympathetic understanding and treatment of the malady of homesickness as well as minor ailments which might prevent his continuing at work, but would not require his admission to a hospital. They are not spoon-fed, but rather taught to be manly and self-reliant.

With reference to misfits Commissioner Lamb states that experience has shown that boys settle well, but in the nature of things there are bound to be misfits. Even employers are not always what they might be. There is no possible guarantee that a lad will be comfortably settled in his first situation and this is where the army's organization is particularly effective. Among the boys there are the proverbial "rolling stones" as well as a large percentage who want to improve themselves and to see the world. It is worthy of note, however, that of 594 youths settled overseas in 1925, 86 per cent were known to be still on farms on Dec. 31st, 1926, while but 6 1/2 per cent were to be found in large cities.

The Markets

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que. Sept. 11.—There was an improved demand for English importers for Canadian spring wheat in the Montreal market on Saturday and a moderate amount of business was done for September shipment. Owing to the weakness in the Winnipeg future market for oats local spot prices for car lots of Canadian western oats were reduced one cent per bushel. No. 2 C. W. were quoted at 72 cents and No. 3 at 69 cents per bushel. The undertone to the spring wheat flour market continued easier but prices showed no change. Sales of some fair sized lots were made to foreign buyers for future and nearlines of millfeed were well maintained under a good demand. The market for standard grades of rolled oats was firm under a moderate demand. The demand for fresh and storage grades of eggs continued active and prices were firmly maintained. The receipts Saturday were 472 cases. The butter trade was moderately active and the undertone was steady. The receipts were 2,084 packages. The foreign and local demand for all grades of cheese continued good, and a fairly active business was transacted. Prices were unchanged. The receipts were 7,901 boxes. Shipments. The domestic trade was quiet. There was no change in winter wheat flour and the volume of business was small. Prices for all
