## VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

Under the provisions of the Youth Training Schedule of the Federal Provincial Vocational Training Agreement the following short term courses for young men and young women from sixteen to thirty years of age will be offered beginning on the dates mentioned in the description of each course.

Course 1. HOME MANAGEMENT: This course will include Home Management, Cooking, Sewing, Home Nursing and Health. The course will last six weeks and a second course may be offered if there are sufficient applicants. Course begins January 4th.

Course 2. AGRICULTURE: A six weeks' course so arranged that in addition to the regular students, those interested in any particular division of the work may attend during the week it is being given. The course will be divided as follows:

- Livestock First Aid.
- Feeds and Feeding and Animal Husbandry.
- Soils, Crop Rotations and Fertilizers.
- Horticulture, Forestry and Special Crops.
- Insects and Plant Diseases.
- Farm Accounting, Farm Machinery etc.

Further announcement will be made shortly as to the dates on which these will be given and the names of the instructors. The course begins January 17th.

If a sufficient number are interested a course lasting approximately four weeks will be given in Grading and Packing of Eggs and in Poultry and Poultry Management. Those applying will be notified of the beginning date.

Course 3. FARM MECHANICS: A four months' course to include care and repair of farm machinery, tractors, cars and gas engines, harness repair, elementary electricity, pipe fitting, blacksmithing, woodworking and bricklaying. Course begins January 4th.

Those who complete satisfactorily the full courses under the Youth Training Programme will receive an allowance of five dollars a week to assist in living expenses.

There is still room for additional students in the six months' courses given under the Vocational Schools Assistance Agreement. These are: Carpentry, Elementary Electricity, Plumbing and Pipe Fitting, Blacksmithing, Bricklaying and Plastering. For these longer courses students will provide their own living expenses. Those interested should apply at once and be ready to begin on January 4th.

All courses are of an intensely practical nature and they provide a favourable opportunity for young men and women to learn a trade, improve their knowledge and train themselves for wider and more effective service.

No tuition fees will be charged for any of the courses and all materials, tools and equipment required for instructional purposes will be supplied.

Application forms for enrolment in any of these courses may be secured from Mr. Robert Snozelle, Department of Education, Charlottetown.
