HUDSON BAY STOCK BOOMS

TORONTO, April 7.—The sudden boom in Hudson's Bay shares in London is due more than anything to the tremendous amount of money realized at the company's fur sales in London, that are now over.

Reports from the London stock market say that Jefferson Levy and some of his friends were active buyers of the stock around £30, and since then the price has crossed £32. Mr. Levy was out with the prediction that the fur sales would yield the company £300,000. As a matter of fact, the amount was in the vicinity of £380,000. A London paper says: "Monday's fur sales did magnificently for the Hudson's Bay Company. In fact before nightfall the total of the sales is stated to have been brought up to no less than £310,000."

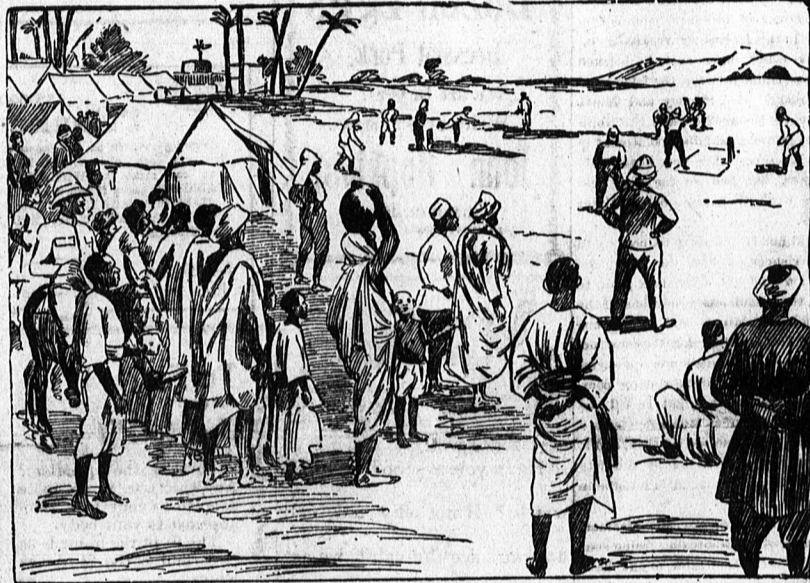
MOUNT VESUVIUS AGAIN BREAKS INTO ERUPTION

And a Stream of Molten Lava is Causing Terrible Destruction—Huge Masses of Stone Hurlled Forth From The Crater—People Fleeing in Terror—Special Trains Help Carry Them to Safety—Earthquake Shocks Felt At Naples.

NAPLES, April 7.—(Special)—Mount Vesuvius is again in the midst of a terrific eruption. The volcano discharges torrents of fire and lava, and terrific bombardments of huge molten stones are hurled from the crater. The town of Boscatrazas on the southern declivity is overwhelmed. Many scattered communities are wiped out and other towns are threatened.

A pall of sulphurous smoke makes breathing difficult and the whole region is panic stricken; and the people are fleeing in thousands from the towns that are in the greatest danger. Special teams are carrying inhabitants away from dangerous places. Two thousand acres of cultivated land are already ruined by the lava which sweeps on resistlessly. Great fear is caused in the more remote districts by earthquake shocks which are

felt nearly as far as Naples. These are growing stronger as time passes. New craters on the mountain side are opening continually; but Signor Mattencio, the director of the Vesuvius observatory still clings to his perilous post. With him is an American engineer named Pierret. Succor and comfort is being sent to the impoverished population.

LIVELY MEETING OF CORK BOUNCIL

CORK, April 7th.—The aldermen and councillors of the Cork corporation at a recent meeting engaged in a violent physical encounter, in which the occupants of the galleries joined with alacrity. A motion to place the president and secretary of the labor council on the technical instruction committee being lost, the disorder began. Members assaulted one another with considerable violence, the furniture being utilized as weapons.

SMALLPOX FOUND AMONG CHINESE

MONTREAL, April 7.—Consternation was caused at the Windsor station the other day when it was discovered that smallpox had broken out amongst a party of 130 Chinamen who were being transported in bond by the C.P.R. One of the coelestials became ill yesterday and this morning his case was diagnosed as this dread smallpox. He was immediately taken to the isolation hospital while the 130 Chinese and a dozen of two other immigrants have been removed to an isolation camp at the back of the Mount-ain where they will be kept two or three weeks pending developments, at the expense of the C. P. R.

NEW AMENDMENT IMMIGRANT LAW

Effective Measure Proposed to Exclude Undesirable Immigrants—Arrangement With the United States Authorities—The Railways and the Steamboats Companies Must Pay

OTTAWA, April 8.—(Special)—By the terms of the bill introduced by the Minister of Interior, the standard of admission for immigrants is raised in some important particulars. The present law only takes notice of physical fitness and of finances. An amendment deals with morals, and

provides for the deportation of criminals and vagrants who reach Canada from Europe or the United States. The agreement has been made with the American immigration authorities by which such may be deported, if apprehended within a year. The steamships and railways must bear the expenses of deportation.

THE CAR STRIKE IN WINNIPEG

Settled as a Result of Efforts of Ministerial Convention.

WINNIPEG, April 8.—(Special)—The street railway strike came to an end on Saturday afternoon as a result of the compromise arranged by the ministerial committee.

The Company agrees to the demanded advance in wages while the men forego recognition of the union under promise of no discrimination against union men except these guilty of violence during strike.

RUSSIANS AND THE ELECTION

St. PETERSBURG, April 7.—The result of the first scrutiny of the votes cast for members in the capital yesterday gives the Progressionist parties nearly 75 per cent of the electoral college, which will choose the St. Petersburg members of the National Assembly on April 23.

The result of the election is regarded as a triumph for the Constitutional Democrats. The candidates of the leagues that are supporting the autocracy were all defeated and the Octobrists polled the lowest votes among those elected. It was remarked that neither Premier Witte nor Secretary of the Interior Durnovo voted. The vote in the large cities was in almost all cases similar to that in St. Petersburg, but elsewhere, Conservative landowners were largely elected, owing to the fact that the community, as a rule, abstained from voting. The pleasant election, whose program is solely the distribution of the public lands among peasants, are not co-operating with the other parties.

THE PROSPERITY OF IRELAND

DUBLIN, April 7.—The prosperity of Ireland, said Lord Londonderry, at the annual meeting of the Belfast chamber of commerce, was on the whole steadily increasing. The Ulster linen industry was making considerable progress, the export of linen last year being greater with two exceptions than that of any other for twenty years. In view of this fact, it was matter for hope that the cultivation of flax in Ireland would be attempted on a larger scale. Alluding to the gift of £20,000 to Queen's college, Belfast, by Sir Donald Currie, the speaker advocated the establishment in the institution of a thorough system of commercial education.
