U. S. May Have To Revise Atomic Control Policy

The time is approaching when the United States may have to reconsider its policy toward international control of atomic energy.

Not only are new weapons applications being developed. There are indications that progress toward industrial use of the new power is more rapid than originally expected.

For more than two years there has been standing before the United Nations a United States proposal to share its atomic knowledge with the rest of the world, and ultimately to ban the manufacture of atomic weapons, if everyone will agree to certain iron-clad methods of enforcement.

Everyone outside the Russian sphere has agreed. The Russians have made counter-proposals which seemed to contain possibilities, but always hedged them about with impossible reservations. They won't agree to a real inspection system or to abolition of the veto power in the United Nations Security Council on the subject.

The Russian position is understandable in a way. Under international administration of atomic power she could always be outvoted. She fears that she would be restricted in atomic development, whether for war or peace. The rules would be clamped on the game while she is far behind and she doesn't trust the promise of the Western Powers to let her catch up every way except militarily.

She is struggling feverishly to catch up now. If she does, and if she still clings to her theory that she can win the cold war without shooting, some control agreement might be possible. She would then have an equal position in the trading.

The United States control offer still stands, in spite of the fact that Russia might seriously embarrass the United States by suddenly deciding to accept.

I say it would be embarrassing because the offer was made before the United States really knew what it had. It really doesn't know yet. So then, if the cold war is to last as long as indicated by the long term preparations the administration is making for a fight, it atomic energy for industrial purposes might develop in time to be a major factor.

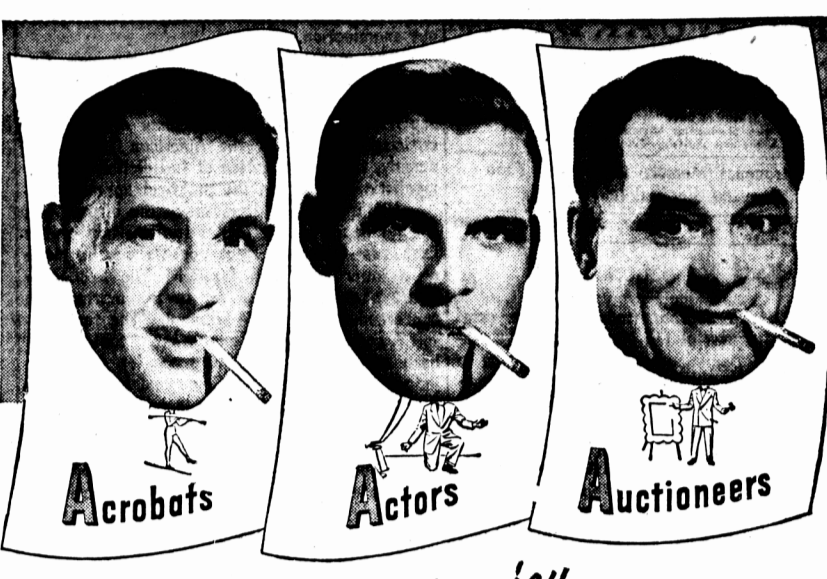

might be to give away the very weapon which will do what President Truman aims to do—raise the world's living standards to the point where Communism will lose its appeal to underprivileged peoples. For Russia would certainly use it to build up her own sphere in defiance of and with designs on the rest of the world.

Until Russia gets it, the atomic bomb in American hands is the world's best guarantee against war. War might have come last summer over the Berlin situation, or it might come over any such crisis. If Russia did not face that deterrent. Just as this military weapon insures against shooting war, so overwhelming strength on the economic front insures against victory by Russian fifth columns in the cold war.

So, when the United Nations Atomic Commission meets again next month, any Russian move looking toward an agreement will have to be looked at very closely. United States policy still is to let the matter rock along in the United Nations rather than withdraw the offer and risk being blamed on moral grounds.

But times have changed a lot since the offer was made.

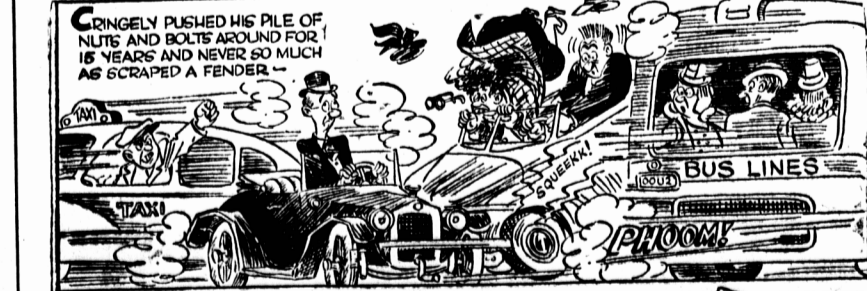
