WESTERN BUSH FIRES ARE STILL RAGING

VANCOUVER, May 22.—Estimates up to noon show that during last night and today damage not less than \$100,000 was done by bush fires within twenty miles of Vancouver. No rain is in sight.

The most serious case is at North Vancouver where there is great fire running up Lynn Valley and sweeping along the sides of Grouse Mountain. Besides a shingle mill, eight cottages were burned and there are forty more in the path of the flames threatening lives. The loss so far unless rain comes very serious losses fully \$300,000.

TRICKS TO GET ASLEEP

The Purposes of Lord Rosebery's Motoring by Night

Inability to sleep, which is proving a serious complication after Lord Rosebery's operation, has been his enemy for years. To combat it he has been in the habit of taking motor car drives just before bedtime, changing his bedroom, and counting imaginary sheep passing one by one through a gate.

"Insomnia is one of the penalties of the increasing strain modern life throws upon our brains," said a physician of St. Bartholomew's Hospital. "The man who works with his muscles and lives in the open air is rarely a victim of sleeplessness."

"The essentials for a good night's rest are mental repose, a requisite amount of muscular fatigue, comfortable body heat, and plenty of ventilation. The most difficult to secure is lessened brain activity. An excellent plan, is to take a brisk half-hour's walk just before bedtime, followed by a hot bath and a rub down, and then a cup of warm milk and a biscuit or two as one gets into bed. If, in addition, the mind be focused on some pleasant but not exciting topic a night's rest is assured to all but the most chronic sufferer."

"The type in which the sleeper suddenly wakes an hour or so after having fallen asleep, usually means that more outdoor muscular exercise is required."

HIGH PRICES FOR DOGS

English Canine Aristocrats Are Sold to America

When the rage for pugs set in, several enterprising fanciers made expeditions into the East End of London, and picked up for \$25 or \$40 dogs that they subsequently sold for anything up to \$500.

Pekingese fetch astonishing prices. There is money, too, in fox terriers. A Bristol gentleman, while strolling through that city a few months ago, saw in a pigeon shop a small terrier, and, going inside, purchased it for \$1.25. It has since won the first prize at a fox terrier show at Bristol, and its value is now, at least \$500.

In another case, a fortunate gentleman quickly made \$800, plus prizes, out of a fox terrier. Anchor by name, this animal was bought for \$25, and knocked down at auction for \$600.

Collies sometimes yield still higher prices to their breeders. A well known exhibitor paid \$5,000 for Champion Ormskirik Emerald, and more than \$5,000 for Champion Southport Perfection.

Even working collies, though generally worth only a fraction as much as the show members of their race, have occasionally realized fancy prices, particularly in Australia, where all the best dogs are of Scottish descent.

A Sutherland gentleman has a breed which has been kept pure for at least 150 years, and he has exported many of the dogs to Australia. For one of these dogs, at the Wangaratta show, a farmer refused a genuine offer of \$2,500, the highest bid ever made anywhere for a working collie.

The most remarkable "deal" on record, perhaps, was one which took place at the Dogs' Home, Battersea, London, England. A gentleman who strolled into that institution, without any particular object, took a fancy for a bulldog, which had been picked up in the street, and bought it for a few shillings. And he never regretted it. The animal turned out a wonderful prize-winner, and attained championship honors.

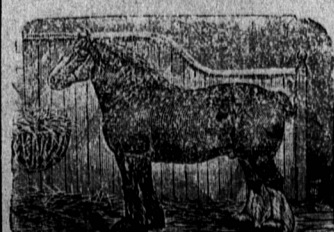
