In opening Mayor Brennan extended a welcome to the new Council and hoped the Council take hold of all dismissions in a lively manner. The Town Clerk then read the election returns—Messrs. C. D. McKinnon, M. A. Paquet and J. F. Sterns were nominated and were elected by acclamation. The minutes of the previous regular meeting were read and on the motion of Councillor Paquet, seconded by Councillor Matthew were approved. The following bills were then passed for payment: P. M. Hughes \$42; Adrian McDonald \$1.50, Expense connected with fire; J. Keefe \$25; C. D. McKinnon \$7.50; Charles Paquet \$1.50; Fire Department \$2.42; John Cheverie \$2.25; Joseph Blackett, \$1.50. The Captain of the Fire Brigade reported the Engine in good working order, hose dry, lanterns, ladders etc in good order, all the men to full with the exception of the one near Dr. McDonald, which contained over six feet of water.
